Summary of Liquor Law.

The following pointers in the Ontario Liquor Law are worth remembering: A tavern license means one allowing the sale of liquor in quantities drunk on the premises. Only one bar shall be kept in any licensed house. The bar-room shall be closed to all persons except members of the licensee's family, or domestic servants engaged in necessary work, between Saturday at 7 p.m. and Monday at 6 a. m. Light in the bar-room is prima facie evidence that a sale has taken place. Any hotelkeeper refusing meals or lodging to travellers is guilty of an offence under the Act. No person of either sex under 21 years of age must be supplied liquor or allowed to loiter around the bar-room or where liquor is being dispensed. Drunkenness or disorderly conduct must not be allowed on the tavern premises, nor must intoxicated persons be supplied with liquor. No hotelkeeper must permit persons of notorious bad character to meet on his premises. Gambling, or games for drinks are contrary to the law. So is any exhibition of curiosities, boxing, fencing or trials of skill. No entertainment of music, dancing or other exhibitions are permitted, and no slot machines are to be placed in the bar-room.

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News Notes.

The July wheat corner ended on the Winnipeg Exchange Monday with \$1.30 per bushel, a record price at the close. Property to the value of \$71,000, including 19 horses, were burned at an early morning fire on the esplanade, Toronto, Saturday morning. The steamer Argyle, formerly Empress of India, ran on the rocks at Stony Point near Csiawa and was wrecked. The 150 passengers on board were safely transferred to another boat. Wm. Sylvester, a former reeve of York township, died at his home at Deer Park on the 1st inst., aged 63 years. Interment this afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Mount Pleasant Cemetery. H. J. Hill, for twenty years manager of the Toronto Industrial Exhibition, died at his home, Lake Shore Avenue, Island Park, Tuesday night, after a protracted illness. Deceased was 57 years of age. The Metropolitan Railway appealed against their assessment of \$6,500 a mile in the town of North Toronto. The appeal came before Judge Morgan who reduced the assessment \$12,000, much to the disgust of Mayor Fisher. The bell, altar cross, carpets, linen and other property of the Anglican church at Collingwood were seized to satisfy a judgment for \$1,800 obtained by a former pastor, Rev. L. H. Kirby, now of Aurora. County Constables Burns and Stewart arrested John E. Milner in the City Monday, charged with shooting and killing a valuable horse belonging to John Garbutt, a Vaughan township farmer, with whom he had quarrelled. The three hotels in North Toronto were closed Monday night in consequence of the local option by-law, which was passed on the 11th of March. The hotels are situated at Davisville, Eglinton and Bedford Park. John Addison, an old resident of Vaughan township, died at the home of his son-in-law, Henry Fry, last Sunday, in his 84th year. Deceased was born in Flodden, England, and came to Muddy York in 1842. Interment in Woodbridge Methodist Cemetery Tuesday afternoon.
