Mr. W. F. Maclean, the Dominion member for South York, has donated the extra \$1,000 indemnity to the Sick Children's Hospital. The Hospital is a worthy institution, and donations can be utilized there to advantage. Mr. Maclean shows by this act that he disapproves of the measure which raises the annual indemnity of all members of Parliament from \$1,500 to \$2,500. People must give Mr. Maclean credit for acting conscientiously in the above matter. If he wished to show his disapproval of the Act, however, he could have done it more effectively by speaking out boldly from the floor of the House.

The list of accidents published in the newspapers day after day is appalling. It is generally thought that Americans across the line are more reckless of life than are Canadians, but, unfortunately it would seem we are gaining on our neighbors in the way of reckless carelessness. Drowning accidents in cances and small sail boats are far too common. Reports go to show that young men frequently take chances not only with their own lives, but with the lives of those whom they should care for and protect. Those who are inclined to be venture some should bear in mind that there is a vast difference between heroism and foolhardiness.

The law providing for the punishment of those who adulterate foods is to be enforced rigidly, and parties found guilty will be dealt with as severely as the statutes allow. The Deputy Minister of Inland Revenue states that the tests will be continued and when a dealer is detected the punishment will be inflicted in every case in as severe a manner as the nature of the offence calls for. Spices, maple syrup, maple sugar and coffee are found to be more frequently adulterated than any other class of foodstuffs, but in many cases the adulteration does not always mean that harmful ingredients are used, but that the customer is cheated by the induction of cheaper commodities.


