### A NEAT VOLUME.

We were pleased to receive a few days ago a neat volume of over 60 pages giving a good description of the Canadian National Park in the Rocky Mountains, Alberta. The work is published by direction of the Minister of the Interior, and is gotten up with much skill and care. The park is by far the largest in the world, and in point of scenic attractiveness is the equal of the best. It stretches east and west from the backbone of the continent,—eastward into the North West Territories and westward into British Columbia. Its area is 5,732 square miles, nearly twice the size of the noted American Yellowstone Park. Banff is the Park's headquarters, a town most charmingly situated, and noted principally for its hot springs which are visited annually by thousands of people. The Canadian National Park is traversed from east to west by the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, which affords an easy means of access thereto. Many of the engravings in the pamphlet are colored, among which are The Bow River Valley, the Fraser River, Banff and the Cascade Mount from the Sanitarium, Lake Agnes and a herd of Buffaloes.
