Ont., Cap. 44., Sec. 15." :—The father of any child born in this Province, or in case of his death or absence, the mother, or Instruction in the Art of Piano Play- any person standing in the place of the parents shall within thirty days from the date of the birth, give notice thereof to the Division Registrar of the Division in which the child was

Sec. 16. "It shall be the duty of every qualified practitioner attending at the birth of any child born within | Hamilton, at the Elgin. this Province to give notice forthwith to the Division Registrar of the Division in which the child was born."

Sec. 29. "Any person required by this Act to report Births-to the Division Registrar who refuses or neglects | for, be liable for every such offence Eyer. to a penalty not exceeding \$10.00 and costs."
