**Register the Births.** To the Editor of THE LIBERAL: Dear Sir,—I am requested by the Deputy Registrar-General to ask you (through the columns of your valuable paper) to call attention of the Public to the following extracts from the "Act for the Registration of Births, etc., Rev. Stat. Ont., Cap. 44, Sec. 15." . . . :—The father of any child born in this Province, or in case of his death or absence, the mother, or any person standing in the place of the parents shall within thirty days from the date of the birth, give notice thereof to the Division Registrar of the Division in which the child was born. . . . Sec. 16. "It shall be the duty of every qualified practitioner attending at the birth of any child born within this Province to give notice forthwith to the Division Registrar of the Division in which the child was born." . . . Sec. 29. "Any person required by this Act to report Births—to the Division Registrar who refuses or neglects to do so within the time required, shall, on summary conviction therefor, be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding \$10.00 and costs." . . .
