Story Wholly Untrue.
Premier Whitney, on having his attention called to the interview in the Toronto World to the effect that dismissals for partisanship among political office holders had been prevented by His Honor, the Lieutenant-Governor, affidavits covering the facts of the alleged partisanship required by him not having been submitted, the Premier took some time to read the article and then handed out the following statement, which explicitly denies that there was any truth in The World article:
"I have seen the paragraph in The World headed 'Affidavit or no Dismissal is fiat of Lieutenant-Governor. The paragraph is untrue from beginning to end. There is no foundation whatever for any statement or suggestion that appears in it."
"It is too bad that a gentleman occupying the position of representative of the Crown, and who is thereby debarred from defending himself, should be dragged before the public in this manner. The relations between the Lieutenant-Governor and the present Ontario Government have been simply ideal, and on no subject whatever has there occurred or arisen any difference or shadow of difference, between the Lieutenant-Governor and his advisers."

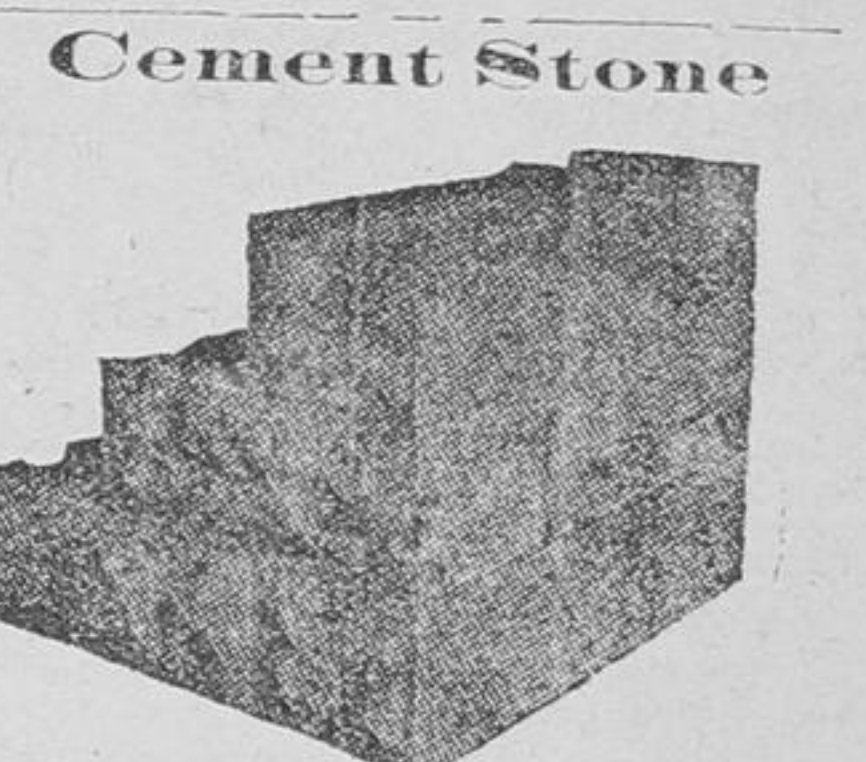
