Vaughan Township Council. The Council of Vaughan Township met at the Town Hall, Vellore, on Tuesday, Sept. 12, at 1 o'clock. Members all present; Reeve in chair. Minutes of last meeting read and approved. A sheep claim was presented by Mr. Wm. Wood of Maple for 2 sheep and 3 lambs killed by dogs. A petition from J. W. Dalziel and 9 others south of Edgely, was presented to the Council, asking them to take steps to have the refuse from the cider mill dumped elsewhere than in the creek, as the water is becoming polluted thereby. The Clerk laid on the table a statement of survey of the 5th con., lots 21 to 25, by P. S. Gibson, Engineer, to the effect that he had done all in his power to effect a settlement, and stated that the Council would have to make application to the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario and ask for an official survey by the Government in accordance with the Surveys Act of Ontario. Devins-Cameron—That the Treasurer is authorized to pay Wm. Wood \$17.00 for 2 sheep and 3 lambs killed.—Carried. Longhouse-Cameron—That Clerk notify Messrs. Winger & Son that the refuse from the cider mill at Edgely must not be dumped in the creek.—Carried. Devins-McNair—That the Clerk make application to the Lieutenant-Governor, requesting him to cause a survey to be made and marked by permanent stone or iron boundaries for the purpose of locating the correct line at the rear of the 4th concession and also at the front of the 5th concession in the township of Vaughan from lots 21 to 25, inclusive, said survey to be in accordance with the provisions contained in sections 14, 15 and 16 of the Surveys Act.—Carried. Longhouse-McNair—That the Treasurer pay the following accounts: H. Winger & Son, building arch, \$25 00 tile 15 00 J. Winger, repairing culvert, 25 G. Board of Education The Board of Education met Friday afternoon. Members present, Messrs. Sanderson, Switzer, Naughton, McDonald, McNair, Hill, Newton. Nine applications were read for the position of second assistant for the High School. Hill-McDonald—That the application of Miss Millie Dingman of Acton be accepted.—Carried. Miss Dingman has a Senior Leaving Certificate, is an undergraduate of the University of Toronto, has taken honors in English and History, and is a graduate of the Ontario Normal College. She has had several years' experience, and supplied successfully in the Collegiate Institutes at Clinton and London. As it was stated at the Board meeting that scholars entering the schools are frequently subjected to abusive ordeals by the senior students, the following resolution was carried:— Hill-Newton—That the Head Master of the High School and the Principal of the Public School be requested to forbid all hazing in and about their schools. The Board adjourned.

Markham Township Council Council met at Victoria Hall, Unionville, on Tuesday, Sept. 12th, with all the members present, Reeve Slater in the chair. Communications received: From D. R. Beaton, clerk of Pickering, claiming that with reference to the account of 1905 and 1904, the greater part had been settled, the work having been performed by rate-payers of both townships. A so calling attention to \$146.18 of this account not settled, Pickering having paid out that amount on townline grants. From Good Roads Machinery Co., re account agreeing to allow \$11.90 off same. The Reeve laid on the table a summons from Albert Helmky against Markham Township Council, claiming damages of \$50 to his barley crop caused by the water being backed up by an improperly placed culvert on road between lots 15 and 16, con. 2. The claim is entered in the Third Division Court and will be heard at Richmond Hill. From Provincial Secretary's Department, showing receipts and expenditure on account of License Fund for East York. Markham township gets \$203.33, Scarborough \$416.67, York \$323.23, Markham Village \$80, Richmond Hill \$188.84, East Toronto \$140. A large number of accounts were presented and ordered to be paid. Moved by Eckardt, seconded by Lapp—That the Reeve, Mr. Hagerman and Mr. Morrison be a committee to investigate claim of Albert Helmky, and also the complaint of John Duncan, with powers to deal with the same as they may deem in the interest of the municipality. Moved by Eckardt, seconded by Morrison—That the mover be commissioner to have ditch cleaned out opposite lot 18, con. 6, amount payable on his order when completed. Moved by Lapp, seconded by Morrison—That Walter Chatterly be paid \$54.37, half amount of putting down cement walk in Thornhill. Moved by Morrison, seconded by Hagerman—That Mr. Eckardt and Mr. Lapp be a committee to confer with Pickering Council in regard to fence being placed on the east townline at con. 4, Pickering. Moved by Lapp, seconded by Morrison—That Mr. Hagerman be commissioner to repair bridge, lot 17, con. 4, amount payable on his order when work is completed. Moved by Morrison, seconded by Lapp—That Mr. Eckardt be a commissioner to have culvert between lots 10 and 11, con. 6, renewed by putting in cement pipe and having same faced on each side. Council adjourned to meet on the 11th day of October next.

Edgely Cider and Jelly Mill Will run on custom work during September one day only, namely: Monday Sept. 25, and will run first three days of each week during October and November up to and including Nov. 15, 1905. Parties wishing apple butter should keep their peeling apples separate from the cider apples. We expect to buy a quantity of cider apples.
