week during October and

cider, boiled cider, apple butter, and
jelly all from your own apples.

Cider can be boiled to any thickness.
Jelly apples should be well ripened
and two-thirds sweet.

Parties wishing apple butter should
keep their peeling apples separate
from the cider apples.

We expect to buy a quantity of
cider apples.

As we have now a capacity of about
3000 gals. of cider boiled into jelly and
apple butter per day, we hope to give
our customers quicker work and bet-
ter satisfaction than ever.

Customers are respectfully request-
ed to do business on the above men-
tioned days as we live a distance from
the factory and customers coming any
other day would find it very incon-
venient.

We hope to see all our old custom-
ers back again this season as usual
with as many more as possible.
