## CABINET CHANGE

Although no official announcement has yet been made it is understood that Sir William Mulock, Postmaster-General, is retiring from the Dominion Cabinet. Since the advent of the Liberals into power in 1896 Sir William has held the one position, and probably in no other department has the progress been as marked as that in the Post Office Department. His resignation will be greatly regretted by his political friends, especially as it is said that ill health is the cause of his withdrawal. It is well known that by hard work, prudent economy, and needed reforms he converted the Post Office Department from an institution that showed yearly deficits to a department that year after year now gives annual surpluses. An indefatigable worker himself, Sir William believes that those around him should earn their wages, and indications are not wanting to prove that there have not been many sluggards in the Post Office Department.

In all probability Mr. Mulock's successor will be Mr. A. B. Aylesworth, a gentleman whose reputation as a lawyer is probably second to none in the Dominion.

## FEEDING CHICKS FOR MARKET

Spring chicks usually bring about seven cents per pound, live weight, when sold without special preparation. A little feeding will give them an extra market value, whether sold alive or dressed, and will pay well for the trouble. There is a good demand this year for a good quality, but dealers do not want the poor scrub. Farmers will do well to put their chicks on the market in good condition. It is said that one can make a pound of chicken as cheaply as he can make a pound of pork or beef, and the difference shows in the price. If you have not customers already, ship only to reliable produce merchants. If shipping alive one must allow for considerable shrinkage.

The Government returns show a reduction of 160 liquor licenses this year. This is an indication that public opinion is decidedly opposed to the traffic.

Japan and Russia have agreed to an exchange of prisoners. By the proposition 1,866 Japanese prisoners will be delivered to their friends, and 64,000 Russians will be given in exchange. The above figures are an indication of the relative success of the two nations in the late bloody war. It will be seen that for every 34 Russians taken as prisoners only 1 Japanese was captured.

The Inland Revenue Department has compiled tables showing the per capita consumption in Canada last fiscal year of spirits, beers, wines, and tobacco. The result shows 1,031 gallons of spirits per head of population; 4,972 gallons of beer; 1,090 gallons of wine, and 2,686 pounds of tobacco. The drinkers and smokers together contributed towards the national revenue what represents a little over \$3.00 for every head of population in the Dominion. This is made up as follows: \$1.840 per head on spirits; \$.204 on beer; \$.40 on wine, and \$1.005 on tobacco. Comparative figures show that the consumption of spirits markedly decreased as compared with the period between 1869 and 1876. The consumption of wine is almost stationary. The consumption of beer and tobacco both show increases.
