THREE MONTHS AT THE MERCER

A sad case came up before T. H. Lloyd, J. P., Newmarket, and Mr. Teely, J. P., Tuesday afternoon in Mr. Teely's office. The complaint was that Maria Moulds, who had worked at the Dominion House, had stolen from the house several articles of clothing and other things on the 5th of October. The landlady having missed the articles, sent a messenger who took from the accused some of the goods just as she was about to board the last regu-

lar car for the north. County Constable Savage was communicated with by telephone, who arrested the unfortunate young woman when she arrived in Newmarket. When the charge was read over to the accused Col. Lloyd said: "Are you guilty or not guilty?" Without a moment's hesitation the accused said that she took the articles. The magistrates felt inclined to be lenient, but as the case was serious they committed the offender, whose appearance indicates she is scarcely out of her teens, to a three months' term in the Mercer Reformatory. He then handed the warrant to Mr. Savage, who took her to Toronto.
