RICHMOND HILL, October 19, 1905

The Toronto World and some other newspapers have been spreading the report that Sir William Mulock resigned his position in the Cabinet because he disagreed with his colleagues in the Government on important questions such as public ownership of the telephone and telegraph systems. Mr. Mulock's speech at a farewell dinner given by the Premier Monday evening lends no color whatever to the rumor. After referring to the pleasure and satisfaction it gave him to assist in the glorious work of nation building, and expressing his regret that, owing to ill-health he has been forced to assume less arduous duties, he closed a very feeling address in the following words:—

"And so I go with a very heavy heart from all my colleagues, because I was in perfect accord with you upon all questions, and enjoyed such happy and friendly relations with you all; but I will take with me into private life memories and, I trust, attachments that will last as long as life itself."

The Mikado of Japan appears to be well satisfied with the treaty of peace which brought the war to a close between Russia and his country. In an official document he declares that the safety of Japan and permanent peace has been assured, refers to the loyalty of his people, and asks them not to be vain glorious after their hour of victory, but to set about to strengthen the Empire.

Rev. Dr. Tovell preached a practical sermon on gambling in its various forms in Queen Street Methodist Church last Sunday evening. The Doctor was right when he said: "This curse of gambling on every conceivable chance in the world is a growing menace to mankind." Large cities like Toronto are full of this worst of vices, and the evil is by no means confined to large cities.

The Conservatives of North York are to meet in convention next Saturday to consider the question of placing a candidate in the field to oppose Sir William Mulock's successor at a bye-election. The World of Monday says there is no lack of good local men, naming the following as being mentioned for the position: A. E. ## Annual Meeting of Curling Club

The annual meeting of the Richmond Hill Curling Club was held in McDonald's shop Saturday evening, Oct. 14, 1905.

Moodie; Secretary, T. F. McMahon; Chaplain, Rev. J. Gibson. Committee of Management, H. A. Nicholls, G. McDonald, T. A. Lamon, G. Cowie—with the above officers.

Mr. Nicholls was elected representative to the Ontario Curlers' Association, Mr. Barker, second representative.

The meeting adjourned.

## News Notes.

Senator Geo. T. Fulford of Brockville died at the Newton Hospital, Newton, Mass., Sunday afternoon as a result of injuries received in an automobile accident a week previous.

Sir Henry Irving, the greatest English actor of modern times, died at Bradford (England) on Friday shortly after he took the role of Becket. He succumbed from an attack of syncope. He was 67 years of age.

William Hastings of Aurora has been appointed by the Board of Works Fishery Inspector of Wilcox Lake, which was stocked with bass by the late Government. On account of illicit spearing and fishing the appointment was considered necessary.
