STEEL RAILS FROM THE SOO

Two thousand five hundred tons of steel rails have been ordered by the York Radial Railway Company from the Algoma steel works at Sault Ste. Marie, and the first shipment was made on Friday. The rails are for the Metropolitan Railway extension from Newmarket to Sutton on Lake Simcoe, a distance of 24 miles. The road has been graded and now awaits the laying of the tracks. Should the rails be delivered rapidly it is probable the whole 24 miles will be "tracked" before Christmas. The rails are 60 pounds and are of the very best quality. The York Radial will purchase almost immediately another two thousand tons of steel rails for the Mimico extension.
