The question of Home Rule is likely to bob up at any time and in any part of the world. A few days ago a resolution was carried in the Federal House in Australia by a vote of 33 to 21, in which it was proposed to request the British Parliament to grant Home Rule in Ireland. A similar resolution was carried in the Australian Senate by a vote of 16 to 11.

Trafalgar Day was fittingly observed in all parts of the Dominion on Saturday. Appropriate speeches were made in many places, and thousands of children marched in procession and placed wreaths of flowers on monuments to commemorate the hundredth anniversary of the death of Nelson, the great naval hero who fought and died for freedom as opposed to despotism.

The Chicago Daily News reproaches the American Government for alienating their northern neighbors by refusal to grant reciprocal tariff concessions. The trouble with Newfoundland over fishery rights is cited as a case in point. The Daily News adds:—"Yet the same kind of treatment is being administered to Canada, and the people of the latter country will find in this latest incident only another proof that their Government will do well to turn from the United States and seek advantageous commercial relations with Great Britain. Rapidly and surely the narrow policy of the stand-patters is alienating a country which should be one of the United States' best friends and costomers."

The following sweeping verdict was returned by the jury who had been enquiring into the cause of the death of Cyrus Rockwood, the bicyclist who was killed by a street car which jumped the tracks at the corner of McCaul and Queen streets on the morning of the 10th of October:—

"That the car was run at too great a speed; that the car was not safely or properly equipped; that the automatic sander was not in proper working order and condition; that the rails and curves were defective; that Motorman Dean was not sufficiently experienced in handling an electric car; and we hold the President, Directors and General Manager were culpable and negligent in their duties, and they are thereby responsible for the death of Cyrus O. Rockwood."
