DIED AT GORMLEY

On Wednesday of last week there passed away at her late home one of the oldest residents of Markham township, in the person of Mrs. Alex. Duncan, sen., of Gormley. Deceased was born in the parish of Montquhitter, Aberdeenshire, Scotland, in 1817, and came to Canada in 1842, along with her father, four brothers and a sister, and settled in Markham township, in which locality she continued to reside until her death. Mrs. Duncan was one of the founders of Melville Presbyterian church, and it is interesting to note that her last appearance at public worship was on Sunday, Oct. 1, on the occasion of the celebration of the sixtieth anniversary of the congregation. Her husband, three daughters, three sons and nine grandchildren, besides a large circle of friends, mourn her loss.
