NORTH YORK.
The official count of the votes polled at the recent by-election in North York was made at Aurora, Tuesday afternoon, November 28, and resulted as follows:—No. of votes polled for Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, 2,729; for Mr. McCallum, 2,235, giving Mr. Aylesworth a majority of 494. The total vote polled was 4,964. In the Dominion general election last year the total vote polled was 4,338, of which Sir Wm. Mulock obtained 2,650 and Mr. Roche 1,688. There were 626 more votes polled at the present by-election than at the general election, and Mr. Aylesworth polled 79 votes more than Sir William.

These include full-page plates of such famous pictures as Correggio's "Holy Night," Del Sarto's masterpiece, "Madonna of St. Francis," and his "Apostle James," and Sir J. E. Millais' "A Disciple." There is also a splendid series of full-page plates showing the harbours and ports in Canada—Victoria, Fort William, Sault Ste. Marie, Depot Harbour, Toronto, Montreal, St. John and Halifax. These pictures indicate Canada's marine possibilities in a most graphic manner. The two leading articles are "Andrea del Sarto," by Herbert M. Vaughan, and "Canada After Twenty Years," by Sir Gilbert Parker. The stories are excellent, and are by Nellie L. McClung, Jean Blewett, Alice Jones, and Virna Sheard—all Canadian women. The description of "A Prairie Fire," by Douglas Robertson, is a vivid bit of word painting, and its vividness is increased by the illustrations. The book reviews are especially good this month, and the departments of comment and criticism are thoroughly interesting. The cover is a beautiful piece of work, with the Sistine Madonna as the centre-piece in the design.
