A letter bearing on the question of local option appears elsewhere in this paper. As we have stated in previous issues, we would like the question discussed from every standpoint. We would prefer letters over the writer's signatures, as they generally carry more weight, but as long as they are reasonable and free from personalities they will be inserted if we believe the writers are in good faith.

As the writer's name is not given we are obliged to withhold certain anonymous correspondence relative to the Carrville gravel pit, as it seems to throw discredit on the Vaughan Township Councilors. The grievance complained of may be well founded, but the editor of this paper is not prepared to vouch for the truth of the charge. A goodly number of newspaper correspondents prefer firing their ammunition from behind stone walls.

Hon. J. W. St. John, M. P. P. for West York and Speaker of the Ontario Assembly, is reported in The World of Monday as saying at a meeting of North York Conservatives, in speaking of license enforcement, that "while public opinion could pass a local option law, sometimes it was not strong enough to enforce it. The Government was considering vesting the enforcement of the license laws with the municipality." Mr. St. John concluded his address by saying: "I tell you frankly that no one inspector can enforce the law in West York, nor could four such officers do it. The Government are anxious to enforce the license law, and to that end invited the co-operation of the citizens."

By the above it would seem that the Whitney Government contemplate throwing the responsibility of enforcing the license laws on each municipality. Will the Province be satisfied with that plan? License inspectors will be looking forward to a happy time. But does it not look as if the Government were endeavoring to shirk their duty?

## Local Option for Richmond Hill

To the Editor of THE LIBERAL:

Your remarks ament the local option by-law in your issue of January 11 will be accepted by all parties as extremely fair and unprejudiced. Our Council has seen fit, as it should do, to test the feelings of the ratepayers on this important question. I would be no party to an attempt to balk the wishes of the people, but recognize that in all movements a majority must of necessity rule. Every individual should be accordingly allowed his absolute free will regarding a measure which so closely infringes on his personal liberty. I might state at the outset that I am opposed to any measure of restriction which is not in accordance with my conscience. We all abhor the drunkard as a detriment to society and an injury more particularly to himself; but is drunkenness the only sin that a good citizen should war against, and can we bring about by restraint what we cannot affect by education and example? Local optionists have my support only in so far as public sentiment, guided by judicious education, will follow them. Our village has been benefited by local option to the extent that one hotel has been made to serve the place of two. This is the best kind of evidence that temperance sentiment is growing and in the right direction. I think I know the make up of our citizens sufficient to believe that no acrimonious feelings will be generated during the local option campaign, and whatever the result, all will faithfully abide by it. I would ask, however, that no mere sentimental zephyrs be allowed to determine a ratepayer's mind on this matter. Let each individual get down to the cold facts of the situation. Our village has now only one hotel, which, if Markham and Vaughan Townships Councils carry their local option by-laws out, will be the only hostelry between Aurora and York Mills, a distance of well over 20 miles. If we abrogate the liquor license by our vote can we expect our only hotel to be kept open for the accommodation of our visitors or transients who expect the ordinary hospitality of the road.

Our loss in revenue not only from the return for license, but in village trading by outsiders who will fail to

come here because of the absence of accommodation, should receive the deepest consideration. Is it right for us to close up what is the only home for the traveller in the municipality? The government has laid down the principle that a licensed house must keep hotel. Is this not being carried out in regard to our hostelry, which entitles it to receive a fair consideration from anyone but a fanatic? The question of local option is one of such vital importance to the future well-being of our village that I have felt impelled to place my views before the ratepayers, and will thank you in advance for the courtesy extended in opening your columns to the discussion of the matter.

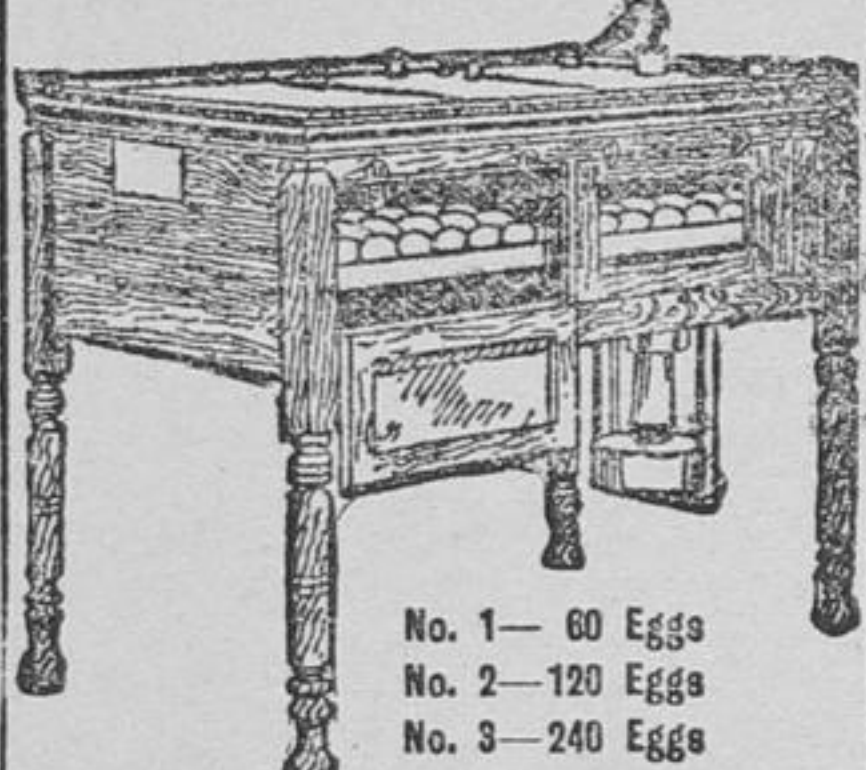

## Government Proposes Temperance Legislation and Would Compensate License-Holders from Fees.

The chief features of the temperance legislation to be brought in by the Ontario Government next session have been drafted and laid before the Conservative members.

The present plan of local option is to be continued with these changes:—

(a) When local option is defeated by the popular vote it shall not be re-submitted for a period of three years.

(b) Only those entitled to vote for members of the Provincial Legislature to have the right of voting on a local option by-law.

It will provide for the gradual closing of such licensed houses as are not really good hotels.

Where there has been no violation of the law compensation will be introduced. The funds for this purpose will be raised by increasing the license fees and by Ontario's sharing the sums now paid for the good-will of licensed premises.

The office of license inspector will be abolished except in large centres of population, the suggestion being that each municipality enforce the regulations for itself.

Drunkards are to be dealt with, as magistrates are to commit them to jail or to inebriate rooms in county poor-houses and elsewhere.

## BY-LAW No.

A by-law to prohibit the sale of liquor in the Municipality of the Village of Richmond Hill.

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill hereby enacts as follows:—

1. That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented, or other manufactured liquors is and shall be prohibited in every tavern, inn, or other place of public entertainment in the said municipality, and the sale thereof except by wholesale, is and shall be prohibited in every shop or place in the said municipality other than a house of public entertainment.

2. That the vote of the electors of the said village of Richmond Hill will be taken on the by-law by the returning officer on MONDAY, THE NINETEENTH DAY OF FEBRUARY, one thousand nine hundred and six, commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and continuing till five o'clock in the afternoon, at the undermentioned place, viz: The Council Chamber situate in Palmer's Brick Block on the corner of Arnold Street and west side of Yonge Street in the said Village of Richmond Hill.

3. That on the TWELFTH DAY OF FEBRUARY, A. D., 1906, at the Clerk's Office in the Village of Richmond Hill, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon, the Reeve shall appoint in writing, signed by himself, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk, and one person to attend at the said polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of this By-law and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this by-law.

4. That the Clerk of the said municipal Council of the Village of Richmond Hill, shall attend at the Council Chamber at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon on the TWENTIETH DAY OF FEBRUARY A. D., 1906, to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law.

5. This By-law shall come into operation, and be of full force and effect on and after the First Day of May next after the final passing thereof.

Read a first and second time and read in committee the Fifteenth Day of January 1906.
