GOSPEL TEMPERANCE

The Temperance Hall was well filled Sunday afternoon when the usual programme was given. The chair was filled by Mr. Wm. Harrison, a solo each was given by Mrs. Hitchcocks and Miss Louie Wright, and a spirited address was delivered by Mrs. Hitchcocks, Toronto. The speaker held the audience spellbound as she pictured the evils and the awful results following the liquor traffic. She was a firm believer in local option or any other form of prohibition, and as hotels are paying in Iowa and other states of the American Union without a bar, she had every reason to think they would pay here. The speaker expressed a hope that the temperance people would roll up a large majority here in favor of local option on the 19th of February. At the close a number of those present signed the pledge of total abstinence and were presented with a badge of blue ribbon.

DIVISION COURT

The greater part of last Saturday was taken up in hearing cases at the court room here, His Honour Judge Morgan presiding. The following were disposed of:—

Stong vs. Powell and McKellar—Nineteen dollars for board. Adjourned to next court.

Feaster vs. Weldrick—Claim for wages, \$52.48. Plaintiff left place without permission before his time was expired. Judgment \$22, without costs.

Quinn vs. Claffey—Hickson, gar., \$34.85. Judgment for plaintiff.

Morgan vs. Clubine—Note, \$110.72. Judgment for plaintiff.

Stubbs vs. Rombough—Gormley, gar., \$50. Judgment for plaintiff. No costs.

Campbell vs. Mager—Note, \$12. Adjourned till next court.

Stiver vs. Calvert—Wages for carpenter work, \$14.50. Judgment for plaintiff, with costs.

Megaffin vs. Hudgin—This case was tried by a jury. Plaintiff sued for the amount of a note, \$137.50 and interest, which Hudgin had given him as balance of purchase money for Oak Ridges Hotel. Hudgin had paid the money to T. H. Lloyd, then of Newmarket, but the latter failed to hand it over to the proper party to receive it. Mr. Lennox addressed the jury on behalf of the plaintiff, Mr. Haverson on behalf of the defendant, and the Judge explained the law in the matter. The jury decided in favor of the plaintiff, Megaffin. Judgment \$137.50 and court costs.

THE SCIENCE OF FEEDING

A combination of different foods combining in proper proportion the different constituents required to produce the desired finished product is called a balanced ration.

The great mistake usually made in the make-up of a "balanced ration" is the omission of those qualities that go to aid in the assimilation of the nutrient-containing parts.
