

BY-LAW No.

A by-law to prohibit the sale of liquor in the Municipality of the Village of Richmond Hill.

The Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill hereby enacts as follows:—

1. That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented, or other manufactured liquors is and shall be prohibited in every tavern, inn, or other place of public entertainment in the said municipality, and the sale thereof except by wholesale, is and shall be prohibited in every shop or place in the said municipality other than a house of public entertainment.

2. That the vote of the electors of the said village of Richmond Hill will be taken on the by-law by the returning officer on MONDAY, THE NINETEENTH DAY OF FEBRUARY, one thousand nine hundred and six, commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and continuing till five o'clock in the afternoon, at the undermentioned place, viz: The Council Chamber situate in Palmer's Brick Block on the corner of Arnold Street and west side of Yonge Street in the said Village of Richmond Hill.

3. That on the TWELFTH DAY OF FEBRUARY, A. D., 1906, at the Clerk's Office in the Village of Richmond Hill, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon, the Reeve shall appoint in writing, signed by himself, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk, and one person to attend at the said polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of this By-law and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this by-law.

4. That the Clerk of the said municipal Council of the Village of Richmond Hill, shall attend at the Council Chamber at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon on the TWENTIETH DAY OF FEBRUARY, A. D., 1906, to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law.

5. This By-law shall come into operation, and be of full force and effect on and after the First Day of May next after the final passing thereof.

Read a first and second time and read in committee the Fifteenth Day of January 1906.

Take notice that the above is a true copy of a proposed By-law which has been taken into consideration by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill, and which will be finally passed by the said Council (in the event of the assent of the electors being obtained thereto) after one month from the publication thereof in the "Liberal" newspaper, the date of which publication was THURSDAY, THE EIGHTEENTH DAY OF JANUARY, 1906, and at the hour, day and place therein fixed for taking the votes of the electors the polls will be held.
