PUBLIC LIBRARY

The annual report of the Richmond Hill Public Library, recently forwarded to the Education Department, shows the receipts of last year to be \$218.87, expenditure \$185.36, leaving a balance on hand of \$33.51, about \$6 less than the year previous. There were 64 volumes of books purchased during the year, 2634 volumes issued to readers, and there are now in the library 3205 volumes. In the reading room are 3 daily newspapers, 6 weeklies, and 11 magazines. The library and reading room are open Tuesday and Saturday evenings from 7 to 9 o'clock.

SHOCKING TRAGEDY

John McAvoy, an unmarried man, working for Robert Elliott, about a mile north of Elgin Mills, committed suicide by hanging himself in the barn about 7 o'clock on Sunday morning, 18th inst. It was a most deliberate act, as there were several others working about the barn within a few yards of him at the time of the tragedy, and he was suspended in such a manner that he could have regained the standing position with little effort. Dr. Carleton of Thornhill, coroner for York County, after hearing the statements of Mr. Elliott and others, deemed an inquest unnecessary and issued a warrant for the burial.

To the credit of the person referred to it may be said he gave no further trouble.
