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## VAUGHAN TOWNSHIP COUNCIL

The Council of the municipality of the Township of Vaughan met at the Town Hall, Vellore, on Tuesday, the 13th day of February, 1906, at 10 a. m. Members present: J. N. Boyle, Reeve, and J. A. Cameron, D. C. Longhouse, I. Devins and J. S. McNair, Councillors.

Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

The following communications were laid on the table:

From L. A. Whitmore and 35 others with petition for travelling lots 6 and 7, con. 4. A grant of \$125 was made for said purpose.

From the Ontario Municipal Association, requesting the Council to pass a resolution authorizing the Reeve and Clerk to sign a petition and forward the same to the member for West York, asking him to support the Bill, when it comes up for consideration, to relieve municipalities from the heavy responsibility for the non-repair of highways imposed by Section 606 of the Municipal Act.

From T. H. Lennox, Esq., Solicitor, Aurora, with statutory notice of injuries received by Wm. Abbott of Newton Brook while driving on con. 2 with a load of hay. The Council did not take any action in the matter.

Devins—Cameron—That the Clerk be hereby instructed to consult with W. H. Grant, Esq., Solicitor, Toronto, and procure legal opinion as to the closing of the balance of the Shaver Road.—Carried.

Devins—Longhouse—That the Reeve and Clerk be requested to sign the petition received from the Ontario Municipal Association, and have the same forwarded to the Honourable the Member for West York, and ask him to present the same to the House, and also to support the "Bill" when it comes up for consideration, and to have the Seal of the Corporation attached thereto.—Carried.

The clerk read his certificate of the polling on Monday, Feb. 19, on the Local Option By-Law.

By a unanimous vote of the council the by-law—now to be known as by-law No. 203—was given its third reading and finally passed, and the signatures of the Reeve and clerk, and the Corporate Seal of the Village attached thereto. There being no further business, the council adjourned.
