And the entertainment should not only be as good as, but better than, under the old conditions. This means thoroughly organized and well-planned work in some localities, but it will pay many times over."

Lach person in Ontario who wishes to join in the work may choose any ONE of the experiments for 1306, and apply for the same. The material will be furnished in the order in which the applications are received until the supply is exhausted. It might be well for each applicant to make a second choice, for fear the first could not be granted. All material will be furnished entire ly free of charge to each applicant, and the produce of the plots will, of course, become the property of the person who conducts the experiment.




