Hanna and John Fleming; Deer Park, James O'Halloran; Fairbank, W. B. O'Leary; Fisherville, Abner Cherry; Weston, W. J. Bourke and John Baillie (in the case of Mr. Baillie a permit only was granted, which will be revoked at the end of three months if the premises are not placed in a sanitary condition by the landlord); Mrs. Lellis, three months' permit in which to place her building in proper shape. Inspector Mackenzie will be at his office, 15 West Dundas street, Toronto Junction, at 10 o'clock, on April 27, to issue the license to those entitled to receive them.

News Notes.

James Jordan was charged in the Police Court, Monday, with stealing a web of cloth from Williamson's, 113 King Street, Toronto, on Saturday. Mr. Fred Coles, cutter in that shop, chased Jordan down a lane and caught him with the web under his arm. He elected to be tried by a jury, and was committed for trial.

The Dominion Parliament, without a dissenting voice, voted \$100,000 for the sufferers of the San Francisco disaster, thus showing the desire of humanity to help their fellow man in time of distress.

Crown Attorney J. Walter Curry, who brought about the startling revelations in the York County Loan Company investigation in the Police Court has forwarded his resignation to the Attorney-General, asking to be relieved of his duties on the first of May. Mr. Curry resigned to accept the managership in Cuba of the Canada Cuba Land & Fruit Company.

Mount Pleasant

The dwelling house owned by Mrs. Isabella Fallis and occupied by Mr. Joseph Hays, was destroyed by fire about noon on Friday, the 20th inst. Part of the contents of the building was saved; The dwelling house occupied by J. McLean, Esq., was on fire several times, caused by the falling cinders. The wind was blowing directly over his buildings at the time of the fire.
