STATUTE LABOR.

Markham Township having gone back to the old system of doing statute labor, the council have made several changes in the by-law governing the same. Instead of being able to commute at 75 cents a day, \$1 must be paid; for each day's work with team, wagon or plough, \$3.50 is allowed instead of \$3, and \$3 for driver, horse and cart instead of \$2.50. Formerly each road overseer was allowed 7 days for the performance of the duties of his office; now he is allowed 15 cents per hour. A day's work now consists of 9 instead of 8 hours.

VILLAGE COUNCIL.

Council met in the Council Chamber on Tuesday, June 5. The reeve and Councillors Sanderson and Glass were present. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

A letter was read from the Provincial Long Distance Telephone Co. on which no action was taken. On motion the following accounts were ordered to be paid:—G. A. McDonald, leather, etc., \$1.50; L. Innes, & Sons, lumber, \$14.00; W. Mager, work on engine, 90c.; The Beardmore Belting Co., packing, \$2.80; Canada Steam Pump Co., repairing fire engine, \$10; Gutta Percha Co., rubber boots, etc., \$14.12.

Councillor Sanderson introduced By-law No. 206, to authorize the reeve and treasurer to borrow \$300 from the Standard Bank to meet current expenditure. The by-law was read a first, second and third time and finally passed. On motion the clerk was instructed to procure one hundred 15 inch tile.

Sanderson—Glass—That the clerk be instructed to have bills printed and distributed, notifying the residents of the village to cut the noxious weeds in front of their premises, pursuant to 4 Edw. VII., Chap. 27, sec. 2.—Carried.

Glass—Sanderson—That the inspector be instructed to notify all persons who are in the habit of throwing waste water and other refuse upon the streets of the village, that they must at once cease to do so, as, in view of the hot weather, the practice is a menace to public health.—Carried.

On motion, a committee, consisting of the reeve and councillors Nicholls and Sanderson, was appointed to interview the owners of property on the south side of Centre street east, with a view to obtaining land for the purpose of widening said street. Committee to report at next meeting.
