By-law 817 was read a first and second time authorizing the closing and stopping up of that portion of the public highway running over and across the east halves of lots 11, 12, and 13 in the 8th concession of Vaughan, known as "The Shaver Road."  
Mr. Grant was heard on behalf of the Council, Mr. Smith for Mrs. Thompson, Mr. Cowan for the C.P.R., and Mr. Geo. Elliott on his own behalf. After discussing the question the Council passed the following resolution:—

**Sherwood**

The hundredth anniversary of Zion E. Lutheran Church, Vaughan township, on Wednesday, June 6, went off in good style. On the previous Sunday at both services—morning and evening—the church was filled to the door. Rev. J. Wilson of Maple, preached in the morning and Rev. W. Back in the evening. Both gentlemen did their best. On Wednesday afternoon the social gathering began, with Rev. J. Wilson in the chair, and Revs. Peter Campbell, W. Back, N. Hill and J. Carmichael on the platform. The parsonage lawn was nicely decorated with green arches of spruce, pine and cedar, tents were erected for ice cream and ladies' bazaar, and a larger tent of Pike & Co. of Toronto was used for the multitude who partook of the well-prepared repast and tea. Rev. C. L. Wisswasser began by giving an outline of the historical facts beginning with the year 1793, when Nicholas Cober and Jacob Fisher, his brother-in-law, came to the virgin forest of this old and beautiful township of Vaughan. In 1806 followed John Jacob Keffer and his family, the Stongs, the Murrys, Petermans, the Osters and many others, who united as an Evangelical Lutheran Congregation. From 1806 to 1819 their pastors came from the old Lutheran settlement in Markham. From 1819 to 1827 their old pastor from Somerset County, Pennsylvania, served them. From 1829 to 1839 various pastors preached to them at intervals. Among them was Rev. Mayerhofer, rector of the English Church, in 1850 Rev. Diehl came, 1853 Rev. Fishburn, who served 25 years, after him followed Revs. Duck, McLaughlin, Danlap, Lerch, Hilty, and the present pastor.

The evening programme was directed with Rev. Dr. Gilmour, of Toronto, in the chair; the Laskay Band, who played splendidly, interspersed the solos of Miss Manley and Miss Edith Keffer, who performed their parts beautifully. Dr. Carmichael spoke humorously and to the point. The weather was ideal, the attention and behaviour of so many people remarkable, and the sociability refreshing. The entire day was a success. That pastors and members of the sister churches were so well represented was gratifying to all. God speed and another hundred years to the Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church. Every one in this community ought to secure the beautiful souvenir of the centennial as a keepsake for the coming generation. This church was, 100 years ago, the place where the forefathers of other churches worshipped till they found their own.

The present began in the past, and the past is the foundation of the future—this makes history.

**Maple**
