## York County Council.

Last Thursday a petition of over 1,200 residents of North York was presented to the council asking the members to re-open the question of the resignation of Mr. A. B. Davidson, P. S. Inspector, investigate the charges against him, and if not proven to have him re-appointed. The petition was strongly supported by Mr. Wm. Rennie, Mr. Richardson, Mr. Harvey and other teachers on behalf of the North York Teachers' Association; and by Mayor Roadhouse, T. H. Brunton, A. E. Widdifield, L. G. Jackson and others of Newmarket, all of whom spoke on Mr. Davidson's behalf expressing their convictions that he was an efficient inspector and an esteemed citizen. The petition was signed by 99 out of 104 teachers in the inspectorate. The speakers expressed their belief that the council had acted with too much haste in January last, and urged the members to reconsider what they had done. It was explained that Mr. Davidson had resigned in view of the fact that his dismissal was imminent. The council in committee of the whole decided to get the advice of their solicitor as to the legality of re-opening the case. Acting Solicitor Baird gave his opinion that as another inspector had been appointed and a by-law passed, the council's hands were tied. The matter was then dropped.

The report of the inspector for North York showed a total of eighty-six public schools and 104 teachers.

Estimates for the present year were presented to the Council by the Treasurer at the meeting on Saturday. They show a requirement of \$38,057.74 for general purposes, \$7,699.33 for the Industrial Home and \$4,859 for Court House debentures. It was also reported that the County Treasurer will need a temporary loan of \$10,000 to meet current expenses. This is in addition to the \$10,000 already provided. It was decided to increase the salary of the high constable from \$100 to \$300.

Lieut. T. H. Lennox asked for and obtained an increase of 25 cents a day during camp to the pay of the members of the Governor-General's Body Guard resident in York County.

The motion to donate \$15,000 to the General Hospital will be referred to the electors on the first of January.

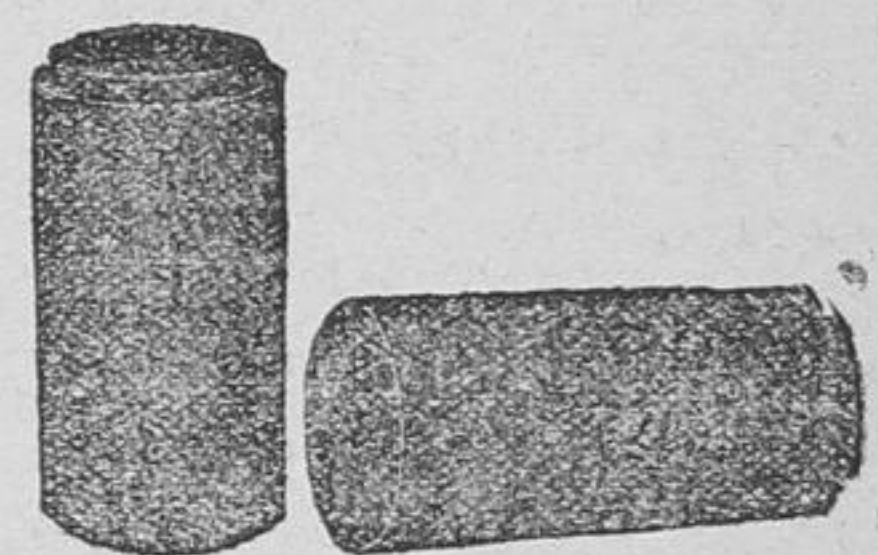
