A GOOD SUGGESTION.

For a number of years past there have been two Teachers' Associations in this county one in the northern inspectorate, and one in the southern. The teachers in each inspectorate meet in convention twice a year. In the north the convention is held sometimes at Aurora, sometimes at Newmarket, and occasionally at Richmond Hill. The teachers in the southern division meet in various places near the city.

In his last report to the County Council the late inspector, Mr. A. B. Davidson, threw out the suggestion that it would be in the interest of the schools, the teachers and education generally to have the two Associations amalgamate, and meet together in some central place.

We believe the suggestion is a good one and worthy of consideration. Years ago when travelling facilities were not so favorable as at present it was probably better to have two separate associations, but with the Metropolitan Railway running from Toronto to Newmarket, and soon to be open to Jackson's Point it is comparatively easy to get together in some central place. The James Bay Railway will also be open for passenger traffic in a few months, and this will bring people closer together in various parts of the country. The larger the number of teachers that meet together, the larger the range of subjects, and the wider will be the discussions. By all means let the two Associations amalgamate.

Mr. Justice Mabee last Thursday gave judgment quashing the local option by-law that had been adopted in Owen sound by a majority of 467 votes out of a total of 2,000, throwing on the town the costs of the case. The judge ruled that there were several irregularities in the taking of the vote, and gave judgment accordingly. The decision has been appealed against, and the License Department has instructed the commissioners for North Grey not to issue any licenses until the appeal is disposed of.

An evidence of the progressive-ness of the farmers of York County may be seen in the large number of splendid bank barns erected from time to time. Many of the new structures embody all the modern ideas, and are a credit not only to the owners but also an ornament to the whole neighborhood. In fact no farmer can now be a successful raiser of stock unless he has first-class stables with modern conveniences. But while much improvement can be seen in the barns in York County during the past ten years; one thing is yet lacking except in rare cases. In driving through some other counties in the Province it is a common thing to see barns neatly painted. This adds much to the appearance of the building, is a great saving to the lumber, and in case a man wishes to sell his farm it may add hundreds of dollars to the price he receives. Painted barns in this country are comparatively few. Where a farmer can give them a coat of paint it will be money well spent.

There is no reasonable excuse for any man or woman to live in a town if they don't like it. If you have no word of commendation for your town, its institutions or people, emigrate. You won't stop the clock by going away. The church bells will have the same musical ring, the little dogs will play just as well and the pure air, bright sunshine and sparkling water will have the same health giving properties. 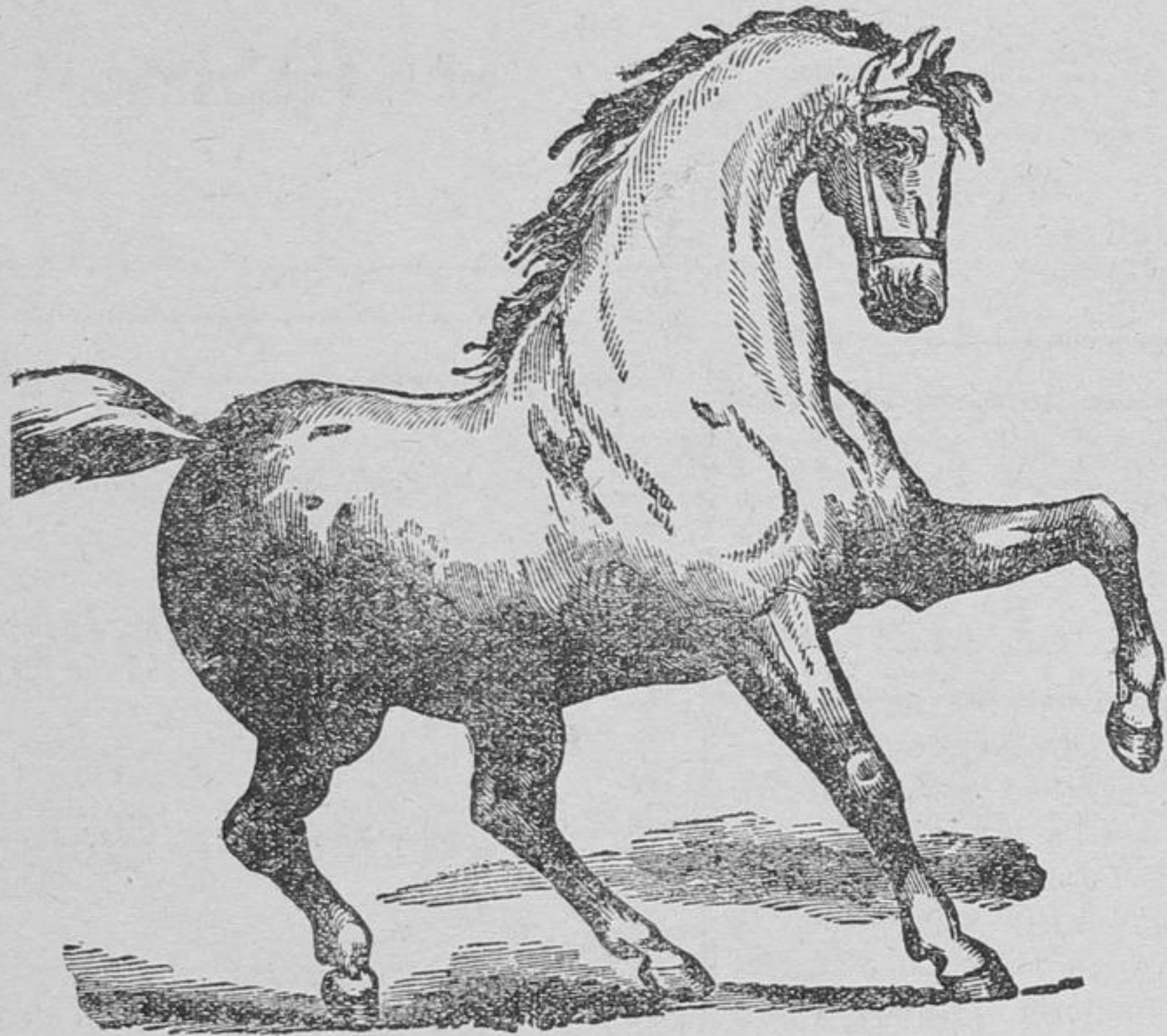
