NORTH TORONTO

THE LATE MRS. O'BRIEN

Sarah Isabella, widow of the late D. C. O'Brien, died at the residence of her son, J. D. O'Brien, Toronto, on Friday last, 24th inst. The call was sudden, Mrs. O'Brien having sat with the family at the tea table the evening before her death. Interment took place in the Richmond Hill cemetery on Monday. Children and grandchildren attended, as well as other relatives and friends from a distance. Deceased was born in this place on the 10th of August, 1825, and was consequently a little over 81 years old at the time of her death. She was a daughter of the late Col. David Bridgford, and resided the greater part of her life in this village, though after her marriage she and her husband removed to Niagara, and afterwards to Sarnia where Mr. O'Brien was Collector of Customs. Mrs. O'Brien was esteemed and respected by all who knew her. She was an interesting conversationist and had a vivid recollection of many of the details of the rebellion of 1837. The funeral ceremony on Monday was conducted by Rev. Mr. Mowbray of Toronto.

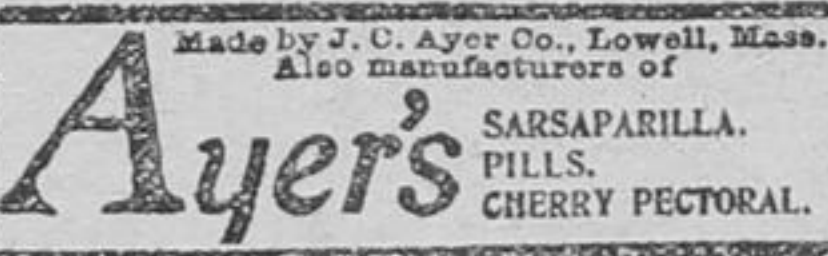
