Bank of Toronto counterfeit tendollar notes, no. 202, 120 of the issue of June 1, 1892, and signed by J. A. Adams and Geo. Gooderham, are in circulation in Toronto, and the police say a gang had planned working the Toronto and other fall fairs. It is a very dangerous counterfeit having passed the officials of at least one city bank without detection. The Bank of Toronto management say this is the first time in 54 years that their tendollar's notes has been imitated.
