SUDDEN DEATH

The sad announcement was made early on Tuesday morning of the death of Mrs. Proctor, wife of Mr. Al. Proctor of Newmarket, and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Wait of Aurora. An operation on the throat was performed on Saturday, but the patient succumbed to the shock at 1 o'clock Tuesday morning. Besides the husband deceased leaves nine children to mourn her loss. Interment takes place in the Aurora cemetery this (Thursday) afternoon at 2.30.

Aurora Banner—A rather singular accident happened on the Metropolitan Railway Monday evening. As the car which leaves North Toronto at 7 o'clock was running past Bond Lake, a large bittern was struck by the car. It is supposed the bird was dazzled by the strong headlight on the car and attempted to fly in front of it. The window in front of the Motorman was broken into small pieces and he was cut about the head and face by the flying pieces of glass. The bird dropped dead just inside the car, having its neck, wing and leg broken by the force of the contact.
