The Township Council of Markham
met Saturday, Sept. 22. All the
members were present. Communi-
cations were read from Dr. O. Sisley,
D. Potheringham, Artesian Wells Co.,
and Jas. Torrance.
A grant of \$30, was made to the
Unionville Public Library.
The amount in excess of the grant
for townline between Markham and
York, \$32.75, was voted.
Alex. Russell was awarded \$8 as
two-thirds value of the thoroughbred
lamb worried by dogs.
Councillor Nigh was appointed a
commissioner to superintend new cul-
verts, lot 32, con. 5 and lot 35, con. 5.
Councillors Padget was appointed a
commissioner to fill in washout op-
posite lot 58, con. 2.
