"EQUAL RIGHTS TO ALL."

We have before us the last number of The Sentinel and Orange and Protestant Advocate, published in Toronto. At the top of the first page in the left hand corner are the words "OUR POLITICS: Equal Rights to All, Special Privileges to none." In the opposite corner we read "OUR WATCHWORD: 'A United Canada, One School and one Flag.'"

The above are beautiful mottoes which give the impression that the paper is the champion of liberty and justice, and that all men in Canada should have an equal chance. But what do we find on the first-page? A bitter attack on Premier Whitney because he appointed Dr. Coughlin to be superintendent of the Institute for the Deaf and Dumb at Belleville. And what are the objections to the new appointee? Not that the Dr. is not competent to fill the position, but simply because he belongs to a certain church.

Mr. Whitney is condemned in three editorials on page 1. Under the heading, "Our Point of View," the first paragraph of the first article reads as follows:

"Mr. Whitney has offended the Protestant sentiment of West Hastings and all Eastern Ontario by his appointment of a Roman Catholic to be superintendent of the Institute for the Deaf and Dumb at Belleville. If the Government has tried to alienate a large body of its supporters, a more effective means could hardly have been discovered than the appointment of Dr. Coughlin. It has disheartened the warmest supporters of the Government in West Hastings, and excited a feeling of dissatisfaction that it will be difficult to overcome."

In another editorial The Sentinel admits that Dr. Coughlin should be rewarded for services rendered the Conservative party, but adds that "to put him at the head of a Public School where the very deficiencies of the children increase his influence over them is nothing short of an outrage upon the Protestant sentiment of this country."

The above shows that The Sentinel's heart is not all bad. It would allow a Roman Catholic to hold a position, provided it was not a very good one. Had Dr. Coughlin, who was formerly a Public School teacher and afterwards a High School teacher, been made janitor of the above Institute, Hon. J. P. Whitney might not have been threatened with extinction at the next general election. To allow a Roman Catholic to carry water and split kindling wood is apparently The Sentinel's idea of "Equal Rights," and should go a long way in building up "A United Canada."

Opinion Parliament has been summoned to meet on the 22nd of November. The House will have three clear weeks in which to do business before rising for the Christmas and New Year's holidays. The Government will submit their tariff policy very soon after the debate on the address has been disposed of, and considerable headway ought to be made before Christmas.

Deacon—McMurchy—That the usual grant of \$20.00 to King Agricultural Society, and also the King Plowmen's Association, for 1906, be made by this council.

Councillor Norman moved that council adjourn to meet at Temperance Hall, Kettleby, on Saturday, November 24.

Starting Monday, Oct. 1st, will run first three days of each week during October and November, up to and including Nov. 21, 1906.
