BROUGHT HERE FOR BURIAL

Mr. Thomas Wilson, for many years a respected resident here, died at his home, 248 Jarvis street, Toronto, on Wednesday of last week, in his 91st year. Funeral from the home, and interment in the Richmond Hill Cemetery Friday afternoon. Many friends attended and looked on the placid countenance of the genial old gentleman for the last time before the casket was lowered. The funeral ceremony at the grave was conducted by Rev. A. P. Brace. Deceased was born in Armagh, Ireland, and came to Canada in 1820, the family settling at Oak Ridges. During the troublous times in 1837-38 Mr. Wilson was arrested as a rebel, and spent six months in the Toronto jail, a visit of which he was never ashamed. He witnessed the execution of Lount and Matthews from the window of his cell. On his liberation he carried on for many years a successful fanning mill business here. Mr. Wilson married in 1839 Miss Lymburner of this place, who died nine years ago. He is survived by six sons and five daughters.
