The Register's attitude will not help matters. The judges before whom the case was heard had to take the law as they found it. Their duty is not to make laws, but I INTERESTING to interpret them and give their decisions accordingly. To compel some faithful teachers who may be 'doing good work, to give up their schools because they do not possess the necessary certificates may seem a hardship in some cases, but it need not be called an injustice. We believe that if The Register would advise all those for whom it speaks to equip themselves with the necessary papers to each it would be better than finding fault with the courts and the judges.
