MEN DON'T ALL SEE ALIKE.

Both of the newspapers in Toronto Junction—The Tribune and The Leader and Recorder—are in favor of continuing local option in that town, but neither of them is satisfied with the manner in which clergymen and other temperance workers are presenting the case to the rate-payers. The Tribune takes Rev. Geo. Dewey to task for speaking of the coming contest as between total abstainers and the liquor traffic. The Tribune claims that such a division might lose the votes of many men who are not total abstainers, but yet are opposed to the open bar.

The Leader and Recorder raps Mr. Ben H. Spence over the knuckles for advising the temperance people to "have nothing to do with procuring hotel accommodation." Mr. Spence is reported as saying that "hotel-keeping should be left to capitalists."

We believe the newspapers are right in drawing public attention to such statements. It seems to be the old story over again, "We must have hotel accommodation but let the other fellow furnish it."

Parents occasionally commit an error by taking their boys from the Public School at too early an age. Good advice is to keep them at school as long as possible. After they have received a good foundation in the home school a term or more at a High School or business college will greatly strengthen them for their future work. But again, they are often rushed off from home without having finished the public school studies. Boys often fail at a business college because the value of a thorough Public School education has been underestimated. Parents need not expect their boys to learn book-keeping and other commercial work properly if the elementary foundation has been neglected.

The Catholic Register is not pleased with the recent decision of the Privy Council affirming Justice McMahon's obligation of having legal qualifications on the part of all teachers of Separate and Public schools alike. The Register's attitude will not help matters. The judges before whom the case was heard had to take the law as they found it. Their duty is not to make laws, but to interpret them and give their decisions accordingly. To compel some faithful teachers who may be doing good work, to give up their schools because they do not possess the necessary certificates may seem a hardship in some cases, but it need not be called an injustice. We believe that if the Register would advise all those for whom it speaks to equip themselves with the necessary papers to each it would be better than finding fault with the courts and the judges.
