### DIVISION COURT

Judge Morson presided at Division Court held here last Saturday. Several cases were adjourned till next court, January 26, by consent of both parties concerned. The only case that required any argument was Cochrane vs. Klinck. The Plaintiff who worked for defendant as a farm hand sued for \$122, made up as follows:—Damages sustained by alleged carelessness on the part of defendant by leaving uncovered a trap door in hay mow, through which plaintiff fell, \$60 wages for work done, and time laid up while suffering from bodily injury \$62. The judge held that plaintiff had not used proper care in going into the hay mow, and therefore dismissed the claim for damages. For wages plaintiff got judgment for \$14.50 and costs.
