RICHMOND HILL, ONT., Dec. 6, 1906

With the exception of Reeve Crosby the present members of the Village Council are again in the field for municipal honors. We understand that County Councillor Pugsley and ex-Reeve Savage will contest the reeveship, and Mr. D. Sloan has announced his intention to become a candidate for the position of councillor.

At a Meeting of the Village Council Tuesday evening Reeve Crosby asked for an expression of opinion on the following question: "When a municipal council passes a local option by-law is it the duty of that council to take advantage of the statute and appoint an inspector to see that the law is enforced?" The members in reply didn't all speak at once, but the opinion was expressed that the question would be appropriate at the coming nomination meeting.

VILLAGE COUNCIL.

The regular meeting of the council was held on Tuesday, Dec. 4 in the Council Chamber. Members present: the reeve, and Councillors Sanderson, Nicholls, Glass, and Trench.

A letter was read from Mr. P. G. Savage, tendering his resignation as a member of the Public Library Board. On motion, Mr. Savage's resignation was accepted.

The following accounts were presented, which, on motion, the treasurer was instructed to pay:—Matthew Morrison, work, 60c.; Peter S. Gibson, surveying, etc., \$17; Ontario Lime Association, sewer pipe, \$8.84; H. Blanchard, work on streets, etc., \$19.35; W. A. Sanderson, formaldehyde, \$6.20; Jno. Casely, teaming, \$1.75; E. J. Cable, well drilling, windmill, etc., \$242.10.

A communication was received from Miss L. Hennessey re injuries sustained by her mother, occasioned by falling into a hole in the sidewalk on Mill street, while engaged in the pursuit of wood thieves. The matter was referred to a committee composed of the reeve and Councillor Sanderson.

The council, pursuant to statute, appointed Mr. Wellington Hall to act as Poll Clerk at the forthcoming municipal elections.

After discussion, the council decided to keep the management of the rink in their own hands during the coming winter season.

The committee appointed to interview the property owners on Centre street east reported as follows:—that W. H. Pugsley agrees to accept \$5; the Parsonage, \$10; Mrs. Durham, \$10; A. Moodie, \$20; and Wm. Shepard, the cost of removing buildings, etc.; and further that each owner is to be furnished with a substantial wire fence and necessary gates.

The committee was instructed to complete the negotiations referred to in the above report.

Council adjourned.

H. S. ENTERTAINMENT

The High School Commencement exercises in the Masonic Hall Friday evening was the interesting event of last week. The hall was crowded, and the programme presented was much enjoyed. The stage was tastefully decorated for the occasion. Mr. Geo. McDonald, chairman of the Board of Education, presided with ability. In his opening remarks he complimented the teachers and pupils on the success of the school, and the good feeling that exists on all sides. Several choruses were well rendered by the school, Mr. J. H. Sanderson acting as director. Mr. Elmore Reaman in his "History of the Graduating Class" made some excellent hits, though some of the lady students thought it a trifle personal. Another interesting feature was the report of the school for the past year by the principal. Mr. Shaw very modestly referred to the success of the school, which had steadily advanced in numbers and efficiency since the third teacher was engaged three years ago. More than 100 students are in attendance, and a class of 10 takes up fourth form work. The presentation of certificates was made by Rev. J. A. Grant and Rev. A. P. Brace, and both of these gentlemen gave stirring addresses, expressing appreciation for the good work being done by Mr. Shaw and his able assistants. Misses Morden and Edwards, Mr. Walter Frisby, at present a student of the Ontario Normal College, gave an able address on lines similar to those of his former colleague, Mr. Reaman. During the evening Miss Clara Horn-

ing gave a recitation, and solos were sung by Miss Ethel Switzer and Miss Ida Glass, Mr. Earle Newton acting as accompanist. A special feature was the play "The scheme that failed," in which the following took part: Mr. Archie Falmer, Mr. Clarence Kinnee, Miss Ada Calhoun, Miss Ada Milne, Miss Edna Alcombrack and Miss Edwards. The parts were well taken, and the audience thoroughly enjoyed the play. The school has a balance of \$30 after paying expenses.
