RICHMOND HILL, ONT., March 14, 1907

Premier Roblin and the Conservative party in the province were returned to power in Manitoba last Thursday. The majority will probably be 15.

Little surprise is expressed that another hockey player has been killed by an opponent in the town of Cornwall. The game has got to be so rough the wonder is that more deaths from the so-called sport are not recorded from time to time.

Under the new regulations adopted by the Ontario Legislature the percentage of fiction upon which a grant shall be paid has been increased from 20 to 45 per cent. of the total sum paid for the purchase of books for use in a Public Library. In future all novels must be classified as fiction.

It is hoped there will be a large number present at the public meeting to be held in the Lorne Hall Monday evening, relative to the by-law to raise money for the purpose of improving Centre street east, leading to the C. N. O. Station and for other purposes. Nothing will be lost by having a frank discussion of the subject. Every citizen should show an interest in the welfare of our village.

A bill to incorporate the Artesian Water Company was considered in the Legislature on Tuesday. The company are asking for certain rights to enable them to deliver their supply of water from artesian wells in the neighborhood of Lemonville in Whitechurch, to Richmond Hill, Weston, Toronto Junction, and North Toronto. The bill was opposed by a large number of farmers, and mill-owners from Whitechurch, Markham, and Scarborough, on the ground that the wells will rob the springs and streams on the lower-lying farm lands. After discussing the pros and cons the Government decided to appoint a skilled engineer who will go over the property and make a report. If it can be proven that the wells will not injure the springs and streams, in all probability the request of the company will be granted. Any person who has seen the volume of pure water pouring up through the pipes will certainly think that such a luxury should not be kept from those who require pure water for drinking purposes.

By-Law No. =

A By-law to provide for the raising of \$1000.00 by way of Debenture for the purpose of widening and improving Centre Street East in the Municipality of Richmond Hill, and also for the purchase of land on said street to be used as a site for an elevator building and for other purposes.

Whereas it is desirable and necessary that Centre Street East should be widened and improved, and that the aforesaid land should be purchased for elevator and other purposes, and

Whereas it will require the sum of \$1000.00 to make such improvements, and

Whereas \$1000.00 is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this By-law, and

Whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the Village of Richmond Hill, according to the last Revised Assessment Roll of the said Village is \$175,311.00, and

Whereas the general debenture debt of the said Village amounts to \$887,557, of which no part of the principal or interest is in arrear, and

Whereas, in order to provide for the said it is expedient to issue a Debenture of the said Corporation to the amount of \$1000.00 bearing interest at 4 1/2 per cent. per annum, and that such principal shall be repayable in yearly sums extending over a period of five years from the date of issue of such Debenture of such amounts that the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in any year in respect of the principal shall be equal as nearly as may be to what is payable for principal and interest during each of the other years of such period, and

Whereas it will require the sum of \$227.79 to be raised annually as aforesaid by a special rate on the whole rateable property in the said Village for the paying of the said debt and interest;

Now, therefore, the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill enacts as follows:—

1. That the Reeve of the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill, be, and he is hereby authorized to borrow the said sum of \$1000.00 on the credit of the Corporation, for the purposes aforesaid, and to issue a debenture of the said Corporation for the sum of \$1000.00 payable at the office of the Treasurer of the said Village;

2. Within the said period of five years, there shall be raised and levied annually by a special rate, in addition to all other rates, upon the whole rateable property of the said Village the yearly sum of \$227.79 for the payment of the debt and interest;

3. The said debenture shall bear date as of the first day of June, 1907, and shall be signed by the Reeve and Treasurer, and sealed with the seal of the said Corporation;

4. This By-law shall come into force on the 28th day of March 1907;

5. That the votes of the electors of the said Municipality, who are entitled to vote on this By-law, shall be taken on MONDAY, THE 25TH DAY OF MARCH 1907, commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and closing at five o'clock in the afternoon, in the Council Chamber in the said Village of Richmond Hill;

6. That on SATURDAY THE 23RD DAY OF MARCH 1907, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon, the Reeve of Richmond Hill shall attend at the office of the Village Clerk, for the purpose of appointing in writing signed by himself, two persons to attend at the final summing up by the Village Clerk of the votes polled on this By-law, and also of appointing one person to attend at the polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this By-law;

7. That on TUESDAY, THE 26TH DAY OF MARCH 1907, at the hour of ten o'clock in the forenoon, the Clerk of the said Village shall attend at his office to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law.

Read a first and second time and read in Committee the 11th day of February 1907.
