Public Meeting.
The Public Meeting held in Lorne Hall Monday evening to discuss the by-law proposing to raise \$1,000 by debenture for the purpose of widening and improving Centre Street East, and also for the purchase of land in said street to be used as a site for an elevator building, and for other purposes, was not as well attended as might have been expected. The meeting was representative, however, and all present were unanimous in supporting the Council in their efforts to improve the village.
Reeve Pugsley, who was elected chairman, explained why it was necessary to submit the by-law, and referred to various places where more money could be spent to advantage. Mr. Pugsley was followed by other speakers, including, Wm. Harrison, Wm. Innes, S. M. Brown, Isaac Crosby, P. G. Savage, J. H. Brydon, John Bestard, T. F. McMahon, J. Casely, J. H. Sanderson, H. A. Nicholls and T. H. Trench.
As to raising the required money there was not a dissenting voice, and if there are any rate-payers opposed to the by-law they were conspicuous by their absence. As there was such agreement of opinion in the thoughts expressed it is unnecessary to repeat the various speeches, but we might say it was pointed out that our taxes for many years past have been much lower than other villages in the Province, that we must be prepared to pay a little more if our village is to make progress, and that better times are in store for Richmond Hill if we take advantage of our opportunities. It was also shown that the traffic in coal and lumber, and freight of various kinds on the C. N. O. Railway to and from Richmond Hill is very heavy, and that good roads are an absolute necessity.
The chairman suggested that all present take an interest in getting out the vote on Monday next.
