## MARKHAM TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

Council met at Unionville on Saturday, March 9. All the members were present. Reeve Slater in the chair. Minutes read confirmed.

Communications were received from Alex. McCowan M. P. P., Toronto Automobile Club and Mr. Werret.

Nigh—Padget—That the Reeve and Clerk put their signature to the agreement between the township of Markham of the first part and the Trustees of the Police Village of Mount Joy of the second part, and the same be known hereafter as the Police Village of Mount Joy.

Nigh—Padget—That we pay O. Hemmingway \$16.66 being two-thirds value of one ewe killed and one ewe injured by dogs, the owner of dogs unknown as testified on oath.

Lapp—Morrison—That the clerk be and is hereby instructed to enter the following designated roads in competition for prizes to be given by the Toronto Automobile Club for road improvement:—on 8th con. 1 mile fronting lots 16, 17, 18, 19; on side line 1 mile between lots 10 and 11, con. 2.

Lapp—Morrison—That the following gravel accounts be paid:—  
W. Rankin, 36 yds., certified by C. R. James \$3.60; Joseph Collins, 133 1/2 yds., being half amount \$13.35, placed on south Townline.

D. Doner, cedar for culvert on Townline, Whitechurch to pay half \$1.00.

## GORMLEY GLEANINGS.

The town of "West Gormley" is making rapid strides, and it is only a question of a short time till the "old town" will become a sleepy suburb of its western rival. The Gormleyites are rejoicing in the assurance of a regular station on the C. N. O., which is already doing a lot of business there. The company have built stock and hog yards, and carloads of cattle and hogs have been handled. Mr. Alex. Bruce of Carrick Mills, has imported a number of carloads of corn, which has sold like hot cakes to the surrounding farmers. A temporary platform has been built for the convenience of passengers and the loading of milk, the business in which, from present indications, will soon assume immense proportions.

Mr. Geo. Baker, the proprietor of the North American Cement Block and Tile Co. adjoining the station grounds, has done a rushing trade in coal this winter, some going as far south as below Victoria Square. Mr. Baker kindly allows passengers the friendly shelter of his factory, pending the building of the station.

Mr. D. W. Heise has secured some village lots from Mr. D. Doner, on which he is preparing to erect substantial residences this summer.

Mr. D. Doner is going to build a large barn, the building of which is let to Smith Bros. of Edgely.

Progress is in the air. "West Gormley" lies high and dry, there is abundance of ozone, and plenty of pure water. From the windows and verandas of its homes can be seen the whole township of Markham and a little of Scarborough, not forgetting Richmond Hill.

## THE BREAKING OUT OF THE WAR.

Scores of writers and historians have described the stirring times of the outbreak of the Civil War, but it is doubtful if any one ever drew as comprehensive a picture of the events as does Carl Schurz in his "Reminiscences," in the March McClure's. Beginning with the happenings that followed the election of 1860, the patriotic Schurz arraigns President Buchanan's attitude and the "epidemic compromise" that infected the whole country. The portentous first inauguration of Lincoln is pictured with the hand of a master; and the attack on Sumter and the inception of the conflict are so described that the Great Tragedy unfolds before us as on a stage. Even the comedy foils of tragedy are present, for Schurz's droll wit relieves the somber scenes with humorous pictures and episodes.
