Insinuations have been thrown out against the private character of "members of the Government," and Mr. Emerson, late Minister of Railways, has been charged with immorality. Mr. Emmerson has flatly denied the charges, has resigned from the ministry, and has taken legal proceedings against the Frederickton, Gleaner, the Halifax Herald and the Toronto World. If Mr. Emmerson is guilty of the charges preferred against him he must stand aside a disgraced man; if he is innocent his traducers should not go unpunished.

MR. WHITNEY AND THE PROHIBITIONISTS.

We quote the following from the Toronto News, under date of March 6th:

Arithmos writes: Some of the statements in Mr. Whitney's reply to the temperance deputation should not pass unanswered. The Premier said: "The souls of two barroom bums were as valuable as those of Christians." Who ever denied this? But it is not quite possible that the judgment of two such loafers may be inferior to that of enlightened Christians? If Mr. Whitney does not believe that barroom bums are more intelligent electors than the other class, why does his legislation seem to indicate this? What justice can be found in a law by which three conscientious and unselfish workers for the betterment of the people can have their votes nullified by two men whose opposition is generally dictated either by a tyrannous bodily appetite or by the selfish interests involved? Since the Premier knows that the souls of the wretched victims of drink's thralldom are so valuable, why doesn't he help remove the curse of barrooms from them? And if he will not lift his finger to help, let him at least quit obstructing the efforts of those who are willing to do more than talk. Down with the iniquitous three-fifths barrier to reform; let all be on equal fighting ground! Mr. Whitney attempted to prove that the three-fifths clause is British, but he surely knows that British fair play is known the world over as the direct opposite of class legislation. Therefore, to grant the liquor interests a bonus of 50 per cent. is radically un-British. "Two and two make four," said the Premier. Admirable! Brilliant! When will he advance to the next lesson in arithmetic—that three and two are not equal?

ENTRANCE EXAMS.

The High School Entrance Examinations will be held at the High Schools in Richmond Hill, Newmarket, and Aurora, and Sutton, Mount Albert, Queensville, and Schomberg Public Schools, on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, June 26, 27, and 28, beginning at 8.45 each morning. A fee of \$1 is payable on the first day. Candidates should notify the Public School Inspector before May 1 of the place they intend to write. The subjects for fourth form and entrance are: Part I, literature, history, art, physiology, hygiene, and nature study. Part II, reading (written or oral), writing, spelling, geography, grammar, composition and arithmetic. The literature shall embrace the careful reading and reviewing the previous year of four suitable works selected by the principal from a list of supplementary readings prepared by the P. S. Inspector. The written examination in reading will be based on sight passages and will be a test of the candidate's understanding of what he reads. The non-professional teacher's and other departmental examinations will be on July 2 and continue until the 16th.
