A VILLAINOUS TRICK.

About two weeks ago, one evening after dark, the motorman on a freight car observed some object on the railway track about half a mile north of Elgin Mills. Inquiries were made, and County Constable Tomlinson of Eglinton arrested Fred Frestone, a Bernardo boy, who had been in the employ of Mr. Geo. Newbery. The boy, who is 14 years of age, was taken to the City, where he acknowledged that he was guilty of the offence charged. He was taken to the Children's Shelter, and will be sent back to England.

Mrs. Heise, who had her hand on the stove pipe at the time, received quite a shock.
