### FIRE AT NEWTON BROOK

The fire was discovered by Mr. Stevenson and Mr. Grand while waiting for an early car. They immediately raised the alarm and aroused the family, who with some difficulty barely escaped with their lives. Mrs. Wilson and some of the children had to be taken down from an upper window. The loss to Mr. Wilson will be about \$6,000, without a dollar of insurance. The McCague property was partially insured.
