RICHMOND HILL, ONT., May 2, 1907.

The third session of the tenth Parliament of Canada prorogued by Earl Grey on Saturday, having lasted a little over five months, counting the Christmas and Easter vacations. Nearly two hundred bills have received the assent of His Excellency, the Governor-General.

In an editorial note in our last issue in reference to Travelling Libraries recommended by the Ontario Government the possibility of danger in receiving books that had been in Lumber Camps was referred to. The Government will take every precaution against infectious diseases. The Inspector of Public Libraries writes: "The Travelling Libraries sent to Lumber and Mining Camps will be confined exclusively to such work and will not be used in Old Ontario."

The city of Toronto and the Street Railway Company have long been in dispute over their agreements. Several points in dispute have been taken from one court to another, and it seemed difficult to see how the matter would end. Several items, however, were settled by the judgment of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council last week. The Street Railway won all along the line. The judgment means that—

The company has the sole right to say where cars shall stop to take on or let off passengers, except where there is more than 600 feet between street intersections.

The company need not build lines in any of the new additions to the city unless it thinks them necessary.

If the company does not extend the service as per agreement, the city may give another company the right to do so. The city has no other remedy.

The city is to pay the costs of the appeal and the costs incurred in the various Canadian courts. These are estimated from \$10,000 to \$15,000.

## ROAD INSPECTION.

About 70 miles of roads in the County of York were covered last Thursday by an automobile party consisting of Hon. Dr. Reaume, Minister of Public Works; A. W. Campbell, Ontario commissioner of good roads; W. H. Pugsley, County Councillor; Wm. Dobie, chairman of the good roads committee of the Ontario Motor League; and E. M. Wilcox, secretary of the Ontario Motor League. The purpose was to examine the sections of highway that have been entered in the competition of the Ontario Motor League for the best improved mile of road before Aug. 31 next by various municipalities in the county. The judges in the competition are: A. W. Campbell, W. H. Pugsley and William Dobie. Thursday they examined the state of the roads before improvements are started.

The presence of the minister of public works was regarded as significant, as showing the keen interest which he is taking in the campaign for good roads throughout the province.

One of the entries by Toronto Junction is Dundas-street, the main street of the town. This will be put in first-class condition. Another section on the Kingston-road, near the hunt club, at present in a bad state, will be improved by Scarborough Township. Other entries are: Markham, a mile strip north of the Town of Markham, and a mile on the side line in the second concession; Toronto Junction, a mile on the Weston road, starting north Dundas street; East Toronto, a mile on Danforth road, and Main street; York Township, two miles on the Don Mills road, north from Danforth road, and St. Clair avenue, the road which passes Upper Canada College, between Bathurst and Dufferin streets.

## SONS OF SCOTLAND.

Mr. James Klinck of Yellowgrass, Sask., died in Minneapolis, Minn., after undergoing an operation in one of the hospitals there. On request of relatives here, the remains were sent to Aurora for interment in the family plot beside his wife and children, in Aurora Cemetery. Mr. Klinck was born at Victoria Square about 65 years ago and was a brother of Mr. John Klinck of 2nd con. Markham, and Mr. T. Klinck of Stouffville. Mr. Klinck some years ago, after the death of his wife and two children, removed to Yellowgrass, Sask., where he took up land, successfully completing his settlement duties. Sometime before increasing ailment caused him to seek special treatment. The operation seemed to be successful, as he had written cheerful letters to his brothers and sisters speaking hopefully of the outcome. There must have been a sudden relapse, for soon after came the telegram announcing his death. The interment took place on Saturday, Apr. 27. Services at the grave were conducted by Rev. F. Elliott of Richmond Hill, an old friend of the family.

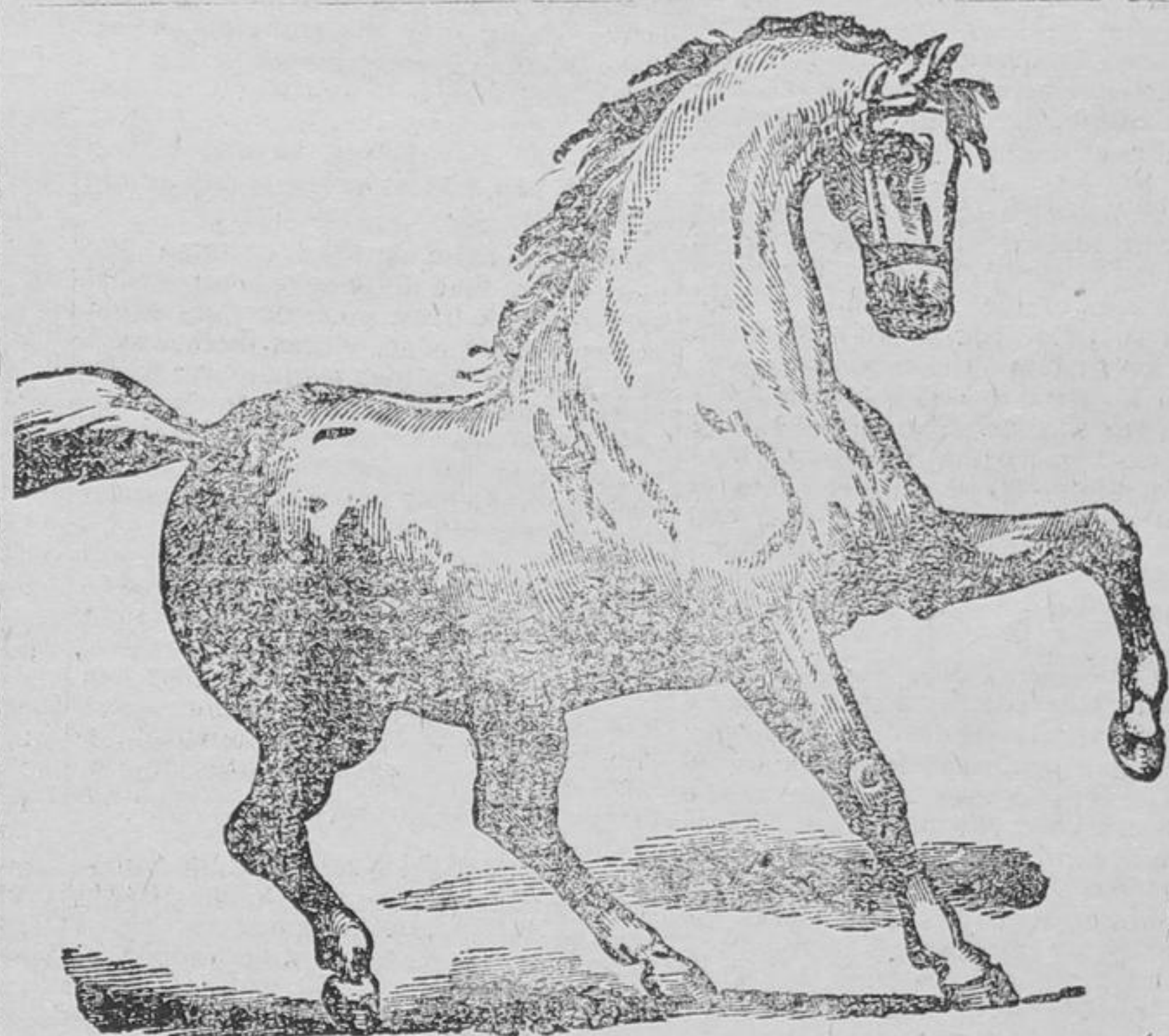

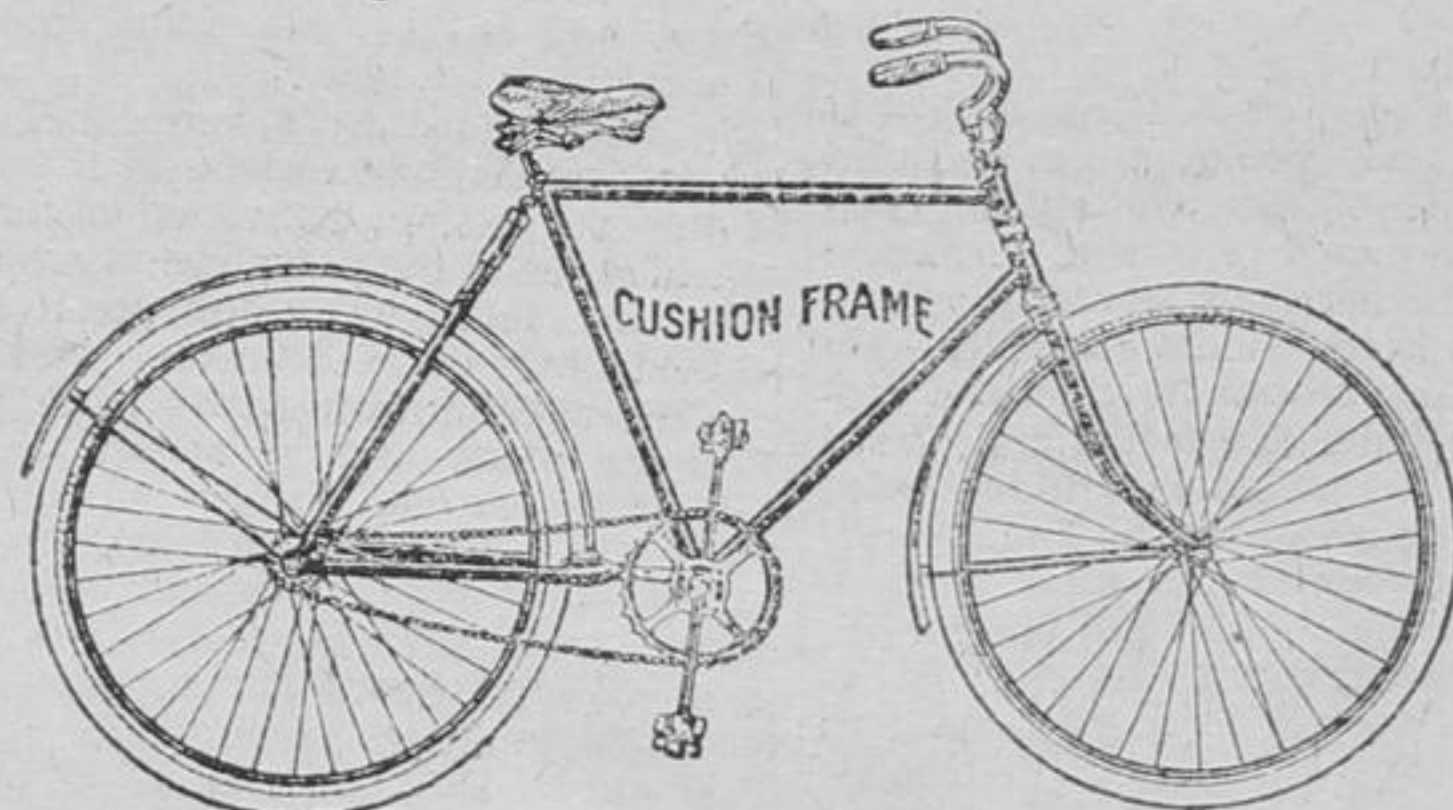
