MEETING OF EXECUTIVE.

INTERRED AT AURORA.

The remains of the late Benjamin Lloyd passed through this place by private car Tuesday afternoon, and were interred in the Aurora Cemetery. Deceased carried on a successful business as a merchant at King City for a number of years, and afterwards removed to the City where he had an insurance and real estate office. For many years he had not enjoyed good health, and passed away last Sunday at his home, 19 Admiral Road. He is survived by a widow and three sons. His wife is a daughter of the late Edward Stevenson of Aurora. The sons are residents of Chicago, Minneapolis and Memphis, Tenn. Col. T. H. Lloyd, Police Magistrate of Newmarket, is a brother. Deceased was 65 years of age.

LECTURE ON JAPAN.

There was a large and appreciative audience in the Methodist church last evening when Rev. D. Norman, B. A., a missionary in Japan, who is home for a year on furlough, gave an illustrated talk, under the auspices of the Epworth League. The speaker referred to Japan as a country with magnificent national scenery, a country whose people are industrious, and in many ways progressive, a people

who have been prominent in the world during the last few years. The lecture was illustrated by over one hundred views, in the hands of Mr. K. M. Cliphams, with an excellent stereopticon. The collection of views was very fine showing feudal castles, shrines and temples, prominent citizens of the country, and many of the churches in the district in which Mr. Norman preaches and works. About the middle of the lecture Miss Mary Trench sang the Japanese National Anthem with good effect, accompanied on the organ by Miss Millie Trench. At the close the lecturer was tendered a hearty vote of thanks, on motion of Messrs. R. Shaw and I. Crosby. After singing, Rev. A. P. Brace pronounced the benediction. The chair was occupied by Mr. T. F. McMahon, Rev. Mr. Norman expressed strong faith in Japan as a missionary field, and made an earnest plea for funds to carry the gospel to that distant land.
