

POSTAL CHANGES.

For many years newspapers from the offices of publication were carried between Canada and the United States free of charge.

The Postmaster General was right in insisting on a re-arrangement of matters. It is not surprising, however, that a sudden jump from 1/2 cent a lb. to 52 cents a year on single newspapers is considered by many as extreme.

Had publishers received proper notice they probably would have raised no objections to the increased rate. But the regulation came into force a month after it was passed.

Hon. J. P. Whitney and his government are to be commended for the stand they have taken in advising that no licenses be granted in municipalities where local option has been quashed on a mere technicality.

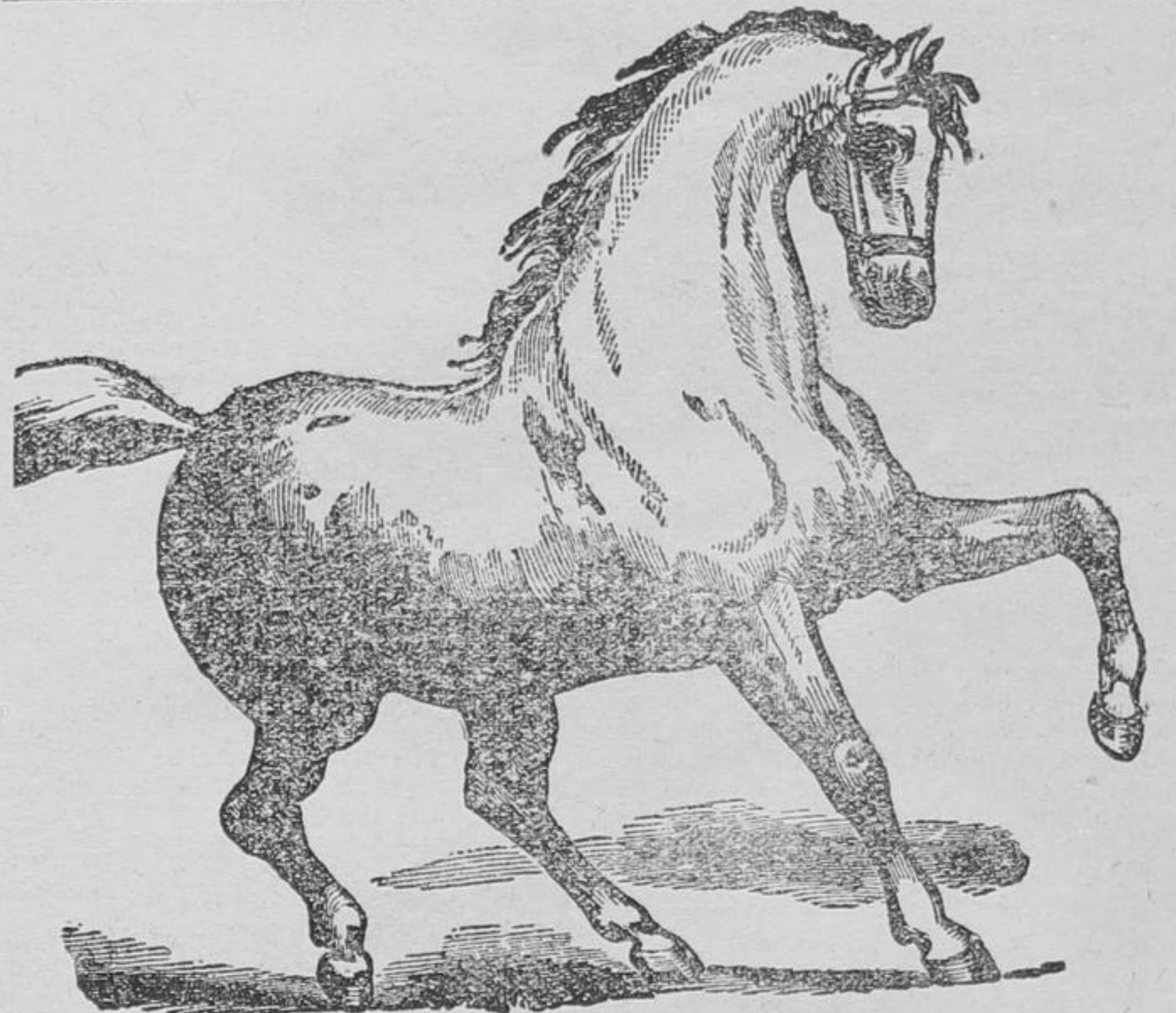

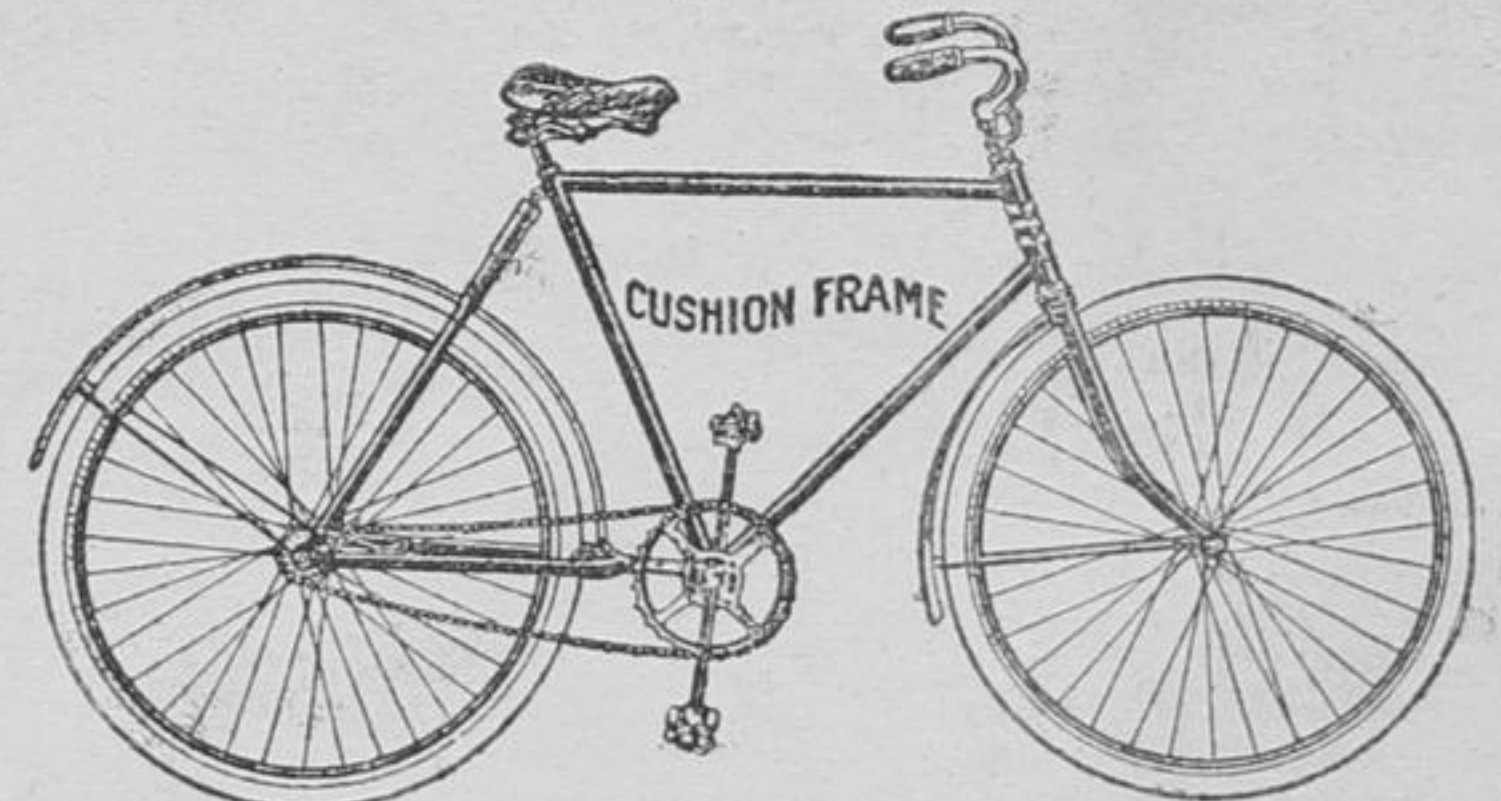
