NEW POSTAL LAW.

The new postal arrangements affecting newspapers between Canada and the United States went into effect on Wednesday, May 8. The postage on THE LIBERAL will now be one cent per copy, instead of being practically free heretofore. In consequence subscribers in the United States will hereafter pay \$1.50 a year instead of \$1.00. The change will, we expect, materially affect our subscription list, but the law must be observed. Those who have already paid in advance will receive the paper for the full term without extra charge although at a loss to us.

MAY CANADIAN MAGAZINE.

Credit is due to The Canadian Magazine for bringing to the attention of students of literature some interesting side-lights on the characteristics of some of the early Victorian poets, particularly of Dickens and Wordsworth. The May number contains an article by Mr. O. J. Stevenson, entitled "The Eccentricities of Genius," in which it is shown that Dickens declined to contribute towards the erection in Westminster Abbey of a tablet to the memory of the poet Cowper. Wordsworth supported the proposal, and the difference between the letters on the subject by these two distinguished writers, is striking and decidedly interesting. The May number contains, also, several well-illustrated articles and five or six capital short stories.

FOR THE CHILDREN.

The children's department in the June number of the New Idea Woman's Magazine contains an unusual number of good things. The third of the Wonder Tales of Northern Lands appears in this issue; it tells how Sif, the wife of Thor, the thunder god, lost her beautiful hair, and the revenge taken on Loki, who committed the theft. This is a splendid opportunity to let your children become familiar, early in life, with picturesque Norse mythology. "How Miggles Shed His Skin" contains instructive information about a pet snake who was kept in a terrarium. The third in a series of comic drawings by John R. Bray, picturing the life of a missionary's little boy and his friends in the jungle, shows the adventure Horace had with a cannibal, and how Jocko and the gruffe helped him out. There are also some verses and drawings which will please the younger readers.
