Miss Comisky attended the wedding of her friend Miss Margaret Henricks of Toronto, formerly of Headford.

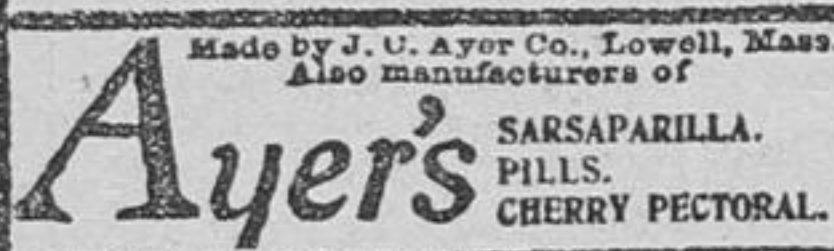
The baseball clubs of the north and south intended holding a match on Thursday evening at the school grounds.
