SUDDEN DEATH.
Seldom has it been our duty to re-
cord so sudden a death as that of Mrs.

Ghas. Kirkland. Returning home
towards evening, Mrs. Blanchard
walked up to the Dr's office and got a
bottle of medicine, she having been
troubled with a weak heart. On her
way home past the bakery she found
herself getting weak and called for
assistance. Mr. Hill assisted her into
his house and the Dr. was immedi-
ately summoned. A stimulant was ad-
ministered, but she sank into uncon-
sciousness and never rallied. Her hus-
band was sent for but he arrived just
as she passed away. The sudden death
cast a gloom over the village, and the
husband and relatives have the sym-
pathy of all in their great bereave-
ment. The funeral takes place this
afternoon at 2.30 to the village cem-
etery.
