**PUBLIC LIBRARY BOARD.**  
The Public Library Board met in  
Mr. Hume's office Monday evening,  
August 5, 1907.  
Present—Messrs. P. G. Savage, A.  
J. Hume, J. H. Brydon, W. A. Sand-  
erson, W. H. Pugsley, T. F. McMahon.  
Also the Librarian Mr. Geo. Cowie.  
A statement by the Treasurer showed  
that the amount received from the  
Government on last year's purchase  
of books was \$47.66, being 50 per cent  
of the outlay. Also that there was a  
small balance on hand after paying  
all liabilities.  
Brydon—Hume—That the village  
Council be requested to levy \$100 for  
Public Library purposes.—Carried.  
Hume—Brydon—That the Book  
Committee be authorised to expend  
this fall \$90.00 for the purchase of  
books, magazines and newspapers.—  
Carried.  
It was suggested that the Book  
Committee purchase the new books  
as early as possible, and that citizens  
be requested to hand to the secretary  
the names of any books or magazines  
they would wish to see in the Library.  
The Board adjourned.

**ORANGEISM IN CANADA.**  
In a recent number of THE LIBERAL  
"Enquirer" states that Orangeism  
originated in Ireland out of a faction  
fight in 1795 between the "Peep-o-day  
Boys" and "The Defenders" and asks  
if any of the "brethren" can tell why  
and by whom it was imported to Can-  
ada. Last week The Orange Sentinel  
published in Toronto, answered the  
question but said that the "Peep-o-day  
Boys" were Catholics. The editor of  
The Sentinel says:—  
"Enquirer" is sadly astray in regard  
to "Peep-o-day Boys." The "boys"  
are said to have been Roman Catho-  
lics. The Orange Order was introduced  
into Canada in 1831 by the late Ogle  
R. Gowan. The first warrant was  
issued from Brockville L. O. L. No. 1 in  
the year named, but the warrant was  
re-issued in 1842. Nassau L. O. L. No.  
4, Toronto, was instituted under a  
warrant issued in 1837, and re-issued  
1844.—Ed."

The town council of North Toronto  
will discuss this evening the advisabil-  
ity of establishing a High school in  
that place.  
Weston will hold the semi-centenary  
of the High School on Thursday, the  
29th of August. The school began in  
1857, known at that time as the West-  
on County Grammar school. The pres-  
ent building was erected in 1875.  
The oldest pupil is said to be Jacob  
Bull of Weston who attended in 1857.  
The late Hon. N. C. Wallace attended  
there in 1863.
