ORANGEISM IN CANADA.

To the Editor of THE LIBERAL:

SIR.—In your issue of the 8th inst. is the following extract from the Orange Sentinel:

"Enquirer" is sadly astray in regard to "Peep-of-day Boys." The "boys" are said to have been Roman Catholics. The Orange Order was introduced into Canada in 1831 by the late Ogle R. Gowan. The first warrant was issued for Brockville L. O. L. No. 1 in the year named, but the warrant was re-issued in 1845. Nassau Lodge No. 4, Toronto, was instituted under a warrant issued in 1831, and re-issued in 1884.—Ed."

Here is the evidence of a Protestant historian:

W. C. Taylor, Esq., B. A., of Trinity College, Dublin, in his History of Ireland says: "In 1795, a Protestant banditti, calling themselves Peep-of-day-boys, served notice on most of the Catholics in the County of Armagh to quit their farms before a certain day, threatening destruction of property, and even loss of life in case of disobedience. To oppose this association, the Catholics formed that of Defenders, which soon overspread the country. Towards the close of that year, the Peep-of-day-boys formed themselves into an Orange Association."

"The Peep-of-day-boys were not checked before they had driven from Armagh several hundred Catholic families. These seeking refuge in various parts of the country, spread through the Catholic body a report, to which appearances gave some sanction, that the extermination of the Catholics was the real object of the Orange Association."

The Sentinel evidently displays his ignorance of the true history of the origin of the Orange Association; as a specimen, he says "The boys are said to have been Roman Catholics," who told him so? Was it the late Ogle R. Gowan, the father of Canadian Orangeism, whose record in Ireland and Toronto is no secret. But, as an act of charity, let it suffice by saying that the offspring is worthy of the parent—"de mortuis nil nisi bonum."

It might be interesting to know the true reason why Mr. Gowan's warrant No. 1 was cancelled, and "re-issued in 1845"; perhaps the Orange Sentinel has been told the reason by some of the worshipful grand "boys" of the association.

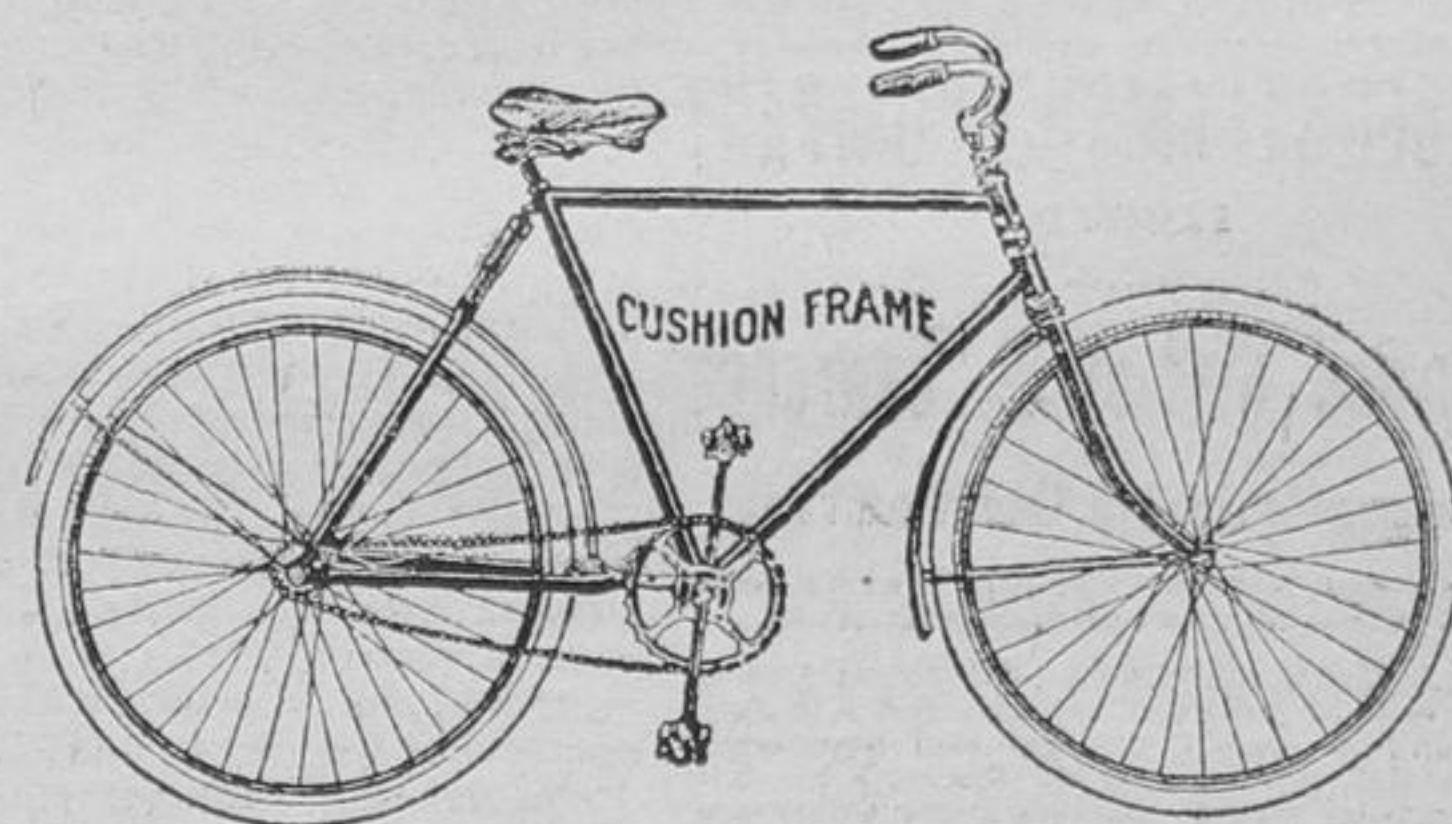
